### WILL RECEIVE MOST ENTHUSIASTIC WELCOME.

Details for the reception about completed—The City to be handsomely decorated—What the arrangements are.

Nearly all the details connected with the proposed reception to former Kingstonsians, both to 27th, have been completed. The executive committee of the Old Boys' Association, upon having received the approval of the city council, have arranged for the reception. A great deal of business was transacted at the meeting. It was announced that subscriptions amounting to \$3500 had been received, with some territory yet to be covered. Over \$1,000 will be needed to carry out the programme as outlined by the committee. The president asked that collectors complete their task as quickly as possible, and hand in their books to the treasurer.

Secretary Shaw announced that the decorative buttons would be on hand by the 15th inst. These are for distribution among home-comers first, then offered for sale to citizens. The designs on buttons and badges are appropriate and the kingstonsians have the sole right to use them. The committee on music reported that the 27th band would play on Saturday and all day Monday. The 14th band would play on Saturday evening, two sacred concerts on Sunday and all morning Monday. The total cost of music will be \$345. It was decided to accept the largest band.

The 47th band will meet all incoming stations on Saturday, and in the evening will play up and down Prince street, while the 14th band will give a concert on the Market Square. It was also decided to supply merchants with programs for decorative purposes. The committee will also distribute 1,000 handsome Chinese lanterns among subscribers.

A committee of ladies, the president announced, would meet in council Wednesday afternoon to arrange for a reception to home-comers. The committee set apart \$100 for the use of the ladies' reception. The ladies in the city hall from two to six and seven to eleven on Saturday, 25th. The women will decorate the city buildings both inside and out, as well as fixing up the fire stations and signs.

# CHEERING PROSPECT.

By the Abolition of the Canal Tolls.

Montreal Herald, Canada is a point at which the grain country receives a severe check. A vessel loaded with 100,000 bushels of grain when it arrives at the head of the Welland canal, has to unload about 60,000 bushels, and sent down by G.T.R. to the mouth of the canal.

For this week the G.T.R. charge two cents a bushel, which rate shows a large proportion of the total rate. The rest of the grain (garbage) from the upper lakes to Montreal. The rest of the cargo, 40,000 bushels is carried through in the vessel, which brings it from above.

If proper elevator accommodation were provided at Port Colborne, the grain could be lighter there into barges, by which it could be taken through the canal and then re-shipped on board the larger vessel.

This is, of course, quite sufficient to deflect the grain in this direction, and as a consequence, a greater proportion of the eastward bound grain is coming via Montreal than in any previous year. It is practically all come this way. The elevator accommodation was adequate. Boston and New York are said to be feeling severely, the effects of Montreal's competition and a number of the steamship lines have in consequence taken their boats away from Boston and New York.

All this is cheering news, and indicates that the deepening of the canal is not a failure, and that there is a goodly field of justification.
