The International Sunday school lesson for July 26th is found in I Samuel xv., 13-23. The galden text is the twenty-third verse. When Saul was made king he promised to obey did not do and was twice rejected.
One should study the whole lesson
history, beginning with I Sanuel, xiii,
to learn all the reasons.

The news of the union of the scattered clans of Israel under King Saul, and their victory in Gilead, soon reached their long-time oppressors, the Philistines. They immediately planned to invade the land, to re-assert their authority and again to terrorize the people into subjection.

Saul recruits the faithful at Gilgal, where Samuel had instructed him to wait before striking the first blow for independence. After waiting a week for the prophet, the king prepared to begin the campaign, and as the initial step, sacrifices burnt offerings. At this juncture Samuel appears and re-'this juncture Samuel appears and re-bukes Saul for disobedience. Saul's sin was not the mere act of assuming priestly functions. It was his self-assertiveness in failing to wait for

Samuel's advice as to God's will in this national crisis. Yet Saul's little army succeeds in repulsing the Pailistines, through the personal bravery of his son Jonathan and the strange panic he causes among the foe.
