Upon this assertion they were refused admission, and will be deported to British Columbia.

**KING'S VISIT Hastened National Unity and Peace.**  
**SHALL CANADA MAKE CONCESSION TO GREAT BRITAIN?**

**Happy Announcement of Grand Trunk Pacific Railroad—A Night Spent in the Vatican.**  
 London, Aug. 3.—Times Dublin special says: The king has hastened by many years the coming of national unity and peace. In at least two provinces attempts were made to impart the warmth of the welcome, yet there, as elsewhere, the king broke down every intrigue of interested disaffection. The outstanding feature of the visit perhaps was the manner wherein the Roman hierarchy unflinchingly welcomed his majesty as the head of the constitution. The king's great relations have smoothed the way for this remarkable innovation. The bishops, far more than the politicians, are still the leaders of Irish democracy, and their advice will undoubtedly kill any absurd and unconstitutional movement, such as Mr. Redmond's intimation, that no corporate body of nationalists should present loyal addresses, where the parliamentary leaders "play the game" of abstention of political and sectarian animosity, which has done so much to retard the country's progress.

**Rev. J. J. McNeill, of Winnipeg, has declined the call extended to him by the congregation of Jarvis Street Baptist Church. Mr. McNeill says that in view of the fact, that the west is rapidly expanding, he believes it is his duty to remain in Winnipeg.**

**Globe Ottawa special:** The report that Germany has opened negotiations with Canada, looking to a reduction of the tariff, in so far as it affects this country, appears to be at least together groundless. The prime minister informed the Globe correspondent that there was nothing whatever in the report.

**At a well-attended meeting of Toronto cat fanciers, a club for the improvement of the feline species was organized. The club will be known as the Royal Canadian, and has adopted the rules and regulations of the Bedford Cat Club of Chicago. Over thirty members have already been enrolled. Mr. P. Ellis is president of the new club.**

**Globe's Ottawa special:** The government learns by cablegram from London that Hon. Edward Blake has been ordered by his physicians to take a month's vacation, and to resign his position as senior counsel for Canada in connection with the Alaska boundary matter. It has not been stated when he will return to the city, and afterwards had supper at the King Edward, before leaving for London.

**At the annual first feather show of the Toronto Canary and Cage Bird Society on Saturday, twenty-three classes were represented. The society has a membership of sixty. An exhibition for grown birds will be held in December.**

**George E. Lumden, assistant provincial secretary, who has been very ill at the General Hospital, is resting comfortably and recovery seems probable.**

**IN STATE OF CHAOS.**  
 How Would You Like to Live in Russia?  
 Vienna, Aug. 3.—A Trieste Journal publishes St. Petersburg messages describing the insubordination of the Kishineff police in consequence of the massacre recently perpetrated at a public meeting, where the head policeman, who had reprimanded him for neglect of duty, Prince Urushoff, for some time ago, was being executed, having been recently wounded by peasants. The Russian police in the United States, who recently forwarded an address to the Emperor Francis Joseph, have also contrived to present the czar with a petition describing the condition of Croatia in the darkest terms. Unlike the Kishineff petition, the czar is said to have received the Croatian petition with benevolence.

**NEW RAILWAYS.**

**JOSEPH HAYCOCK RECEIVES SOME ATTENTION.**  
 Brilliant Scene in Parliament—Weary Workers Do Not See a Best in Sight—Rumors of a General Election.  
 Ottawa, Aug. 3.—The dreary monotony of parliament which followed the resignation of Mr. Blair was sharply changed on Thursday afternoon when the prime minister introduced the long and arduous transportation bill. Galleries and floor were quite full and a few privileged strangers and one senator had seats either on the right or left of Mr. Speaker, where space is rare and precious. The speakers and ladies in general were two rival bands of colours and pictures hats, while the press galleries overflowed, and every place was so hot that each anxious forehead glistened with sweat. Mr. Blair was an animated speaker, and Sir Wilfrid spoke for two hours and a half to an eager audience of nine hundred spectators, during which the bill was introduced and the government by outbursts of wild and tumultuous applause.

**The bill, with the contract attached, covers eighteen pages and furnishes much food for reflection, showing I doubt whether the average taxpayer will take it all in when he reads it for the first time. Everybody is agreed as to the need of a transcontinental line, but the weak point in this huge undertaking is the road from Quebec to Montreal. On this point the liberal party is a unit, save Mr. Blair, who must be eluded among the best of railway authorities. Mr. Tarte is said to speak later this week, when the debate on the second reading of the bill occurs, and will no doubt be found in opposition to at least the eastern section of the railway. 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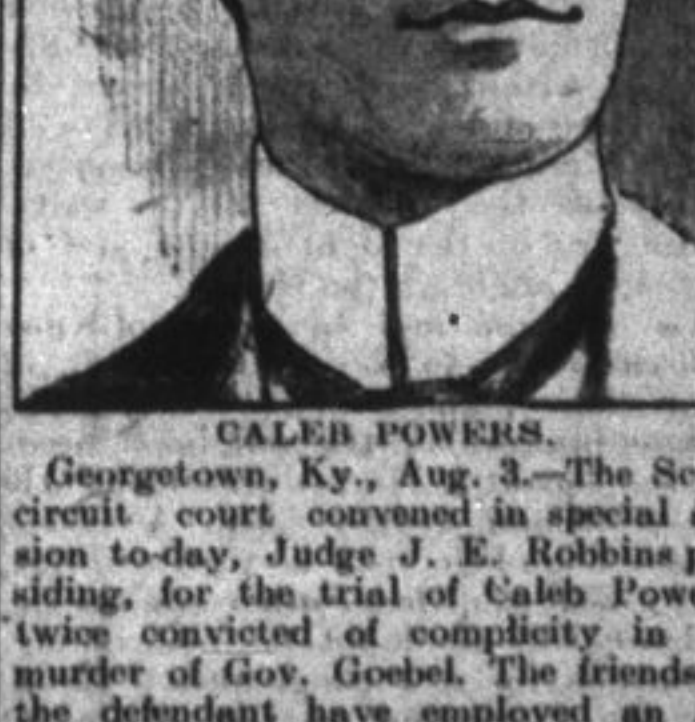
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**THIRD TRIAL.**  
 Of Caleb Powers For Murder Of Governor.



**Georgetown, Ky., Aug. 3.**—The Scott circuit court convened in special session to-day, Judge J. E. Robbins presiding, for the trial of Caleb Powers, twice convicted of complicity in the murder of Gov. Goebel. The friends of the defendant have employed an imposing array of legal counsel and a hard fight will be made for acquittal. Caleb Powers has had two trials. He was first convicted here August 10th, 1900, of complicity in the murder of Gov. William Goebel on the state house grounds at Frankfort in the preceding January. The second trial was held here in October, 1901, the court of appeals having granted it in the preceding March. Again the result was conviction, and a second sentence to life imprisonment was imposed. A new trial was awarded by the appellate court, the action being based mainly upon the refusal of Judge Cantrill to vacate the bench upon affidavits filed by the defense, charging the court with being prejudiced against the defendant.

**WOMAN AGED 136 YEARS.**  
 Passing Of Mrs. Jeannette White, Born January 16th, 1767.  
 Wichita, Kan., Aug. 3.—Mrs. Jeannette White died here at the age of 136 years. She had a family Bible which gives the date of her birth as January 16th, 1767, not far from Louisville. She lived in this city eighteen years with a daughter, Mrs. Mary Clark, who is seventy-four years of age. Her father came from Virginia, and settled on the banks of the Ohio two years before this daughter was born.

**Until two weeks ago Mrs. White was hale and hearty, helping with the family work. She required nearly eighteen hours sleep daily.**  
 She had four children, all living, the youngest nearly seventy years of age, and living in Tennessee. Her husband went Indian fighting before the youngest child was born and she has never seen him since.

**An Heroic Death.**  
 Montreal, Aug. 3.—Prof. George Lussard, a Humane Society gold medalist, swimming master of the public baths at St. Helen's Island, and the holder of a record of more than thirty rescues from drowning, met an heroic death in the swift current of the St. Lawrence river on Saturday afternoon while attempting to save Armand Dupres, a patron of the baths whose strength had failed. Dupres was also drowned.
