THE UNDERWRITERS UNEASY. Accident To Lake Manitoba At Montreal Causes Apprehensions. London, Aug. 3.—Lloyd's correspondent, writing to the Times, in regard to the accident to the Lake Manitoba, says that it was unfortunate that another casualty should have occurred so soon. These vessels were insured on exceptionally favorable terms, and the underwriters are already repenting their liberality. The total loss of the Montreal had already wiped out considerably more than a year's premium on the whole fleet, and the most serious period of the St. Lawrence season has yet to come. These unimportant stragglers sometimes bring heavy claims. Especially in the case of the Lake Manitoba, the vessels were insured for less than their value.

BRISTLES ON HER NOSE. Skin Grafting Operator Has a Disastrous Result. Paris, Aug. 3.—Mme. Biquet has applied to Dr. Durcoux, of Le Vallet, for advice how to get rid of a mole on her nose, which she had had for some eighteen months ago. She explained that after the assault she was taken to St. Louis hospital, where a new piece of skin was grafted on her nasal organ, and that almost immediately hair began to sprout. She had, unfortunately, begun to shave, and now a fine crop of bristles had appeared. The magistrate advised the applicant to consult a collector.

A MILLIONAIRE ROBBED. Burglars Visited His Home And Held Him Up. Seattle, Wash., Aug. 3.—Thomas A. Lippy, a Klondike millionaire, was confronted by three masked burglars in his home on returning from church last night. He was badly beaten, gagged and tied to the post of a staircase. A servant and girl who had previously been surprised by the burglars and tied to the stairway, witnessed the robbery. Lippy was robbed of two gold watches and \$14, all the money on his person. His wounds are considered serious.

PASSED AWAY. DEATH CLAIMS DR. FIFE FOWLER. Entered Into Eternal Sleep This Afternoon—A Short Sketch of His Busy Career—Born in Scotland In 1833. Dr. Fife Fowler, America's oldest physician, died at his late residence, Brook street, at half past two o'clock this afternoon, after several weeks illness. Dr. Fowler was born in 1833 in the town of Aigun, Scotland, and educated at the Grammar School in Aberdeen. At the age of fourteen he entered the arts department of King's College, Aberdeen, where he attended for two years, and was then apprenticed for a period of four years to the late Prof. Fife, of Marischal College, Aberdeen, from which institution he received the degree of M.B. in 1853. Later on, when he had earned the money to pay for it, he took the degree of M.D. from Marischal College and L.R.C.S. from Edinburgh. Between the third and fourth years of his medical course he went as surgeon on a whaler ship to Greenland on a twenty months' voyage. After receiving his degree he practised his profession at Abeno, a village on the Dee side, fourteen miles from Balmoral.

VIEW OF THE COLONIES. Do Not Desist To Be Treated As Poor Relations. London, Aug. 3.—The Spectator, commenting on Mr. Chamberlain's scheme and the treating of the colonies as poor relations, says: "The Canadians and Australians were not expecting or defying any pecuniary advantage when they swarmed to South Africa to defend the flag. Nor if we treated them with contumely would they care what might be lost in asserting their own dignity and freedom."

TO EXPLORE THE WILDS. Of New Ontario, in Search of Nature's Wealth. Windsor, Ont., Aug. 3.—A surveying party, under the direction of Alexander Baird, D.L.S., of Leamington, left Windsor to-day for the wide of New Ontario, to spend a couple of months in exploring the Temiskamingue district, along the Montreal and Ottawa rivers. In the party are Alfred Hallford, D.L.S. of Windsor; David Clark, ex-reeve of Sandwich West; and J. Shull, of Sandwich South. The latter couple are going with the party in search of minerals and timber or agricultural lands. If they find anything that they wish to purchase, they intend to take out claims.

WITH MURDEROUS INTENT. Tough Customer Stabs a Bar-Tender—Is Arrested. Winnipeg, Man., Aug. 3.—A young man about twenty years of age, extremely tough appearance, was arrested last night on a charge of attempted murder. He was raising a racket in the Windsor Hotel, and got into an altercation with the bartender, Edward Corley, who forcibly evicted him, whereupon he pulled a knife and ran at Corley, stabbing him in the abdomen, just below the ribs. Although the wound is a nasty one, Corley probably will recover, unless complications set in.

He asserts that King Peter's position is exceedingly precarious, and that another treaty may be signed at Belgrade at any moment. Plots to assassinate the king have been discovered. The state treasury is impoverished.

A WONDERFUL STORY COMES FROM NORTH FRANCE. Farm Servant, Dumb For Twenty-Eight Years, Recovers Speech—Pilgrims Crowd To See Wonder. Paris, Aug. 3.—The inhabitants of Kerhou, a village near Brest, are in a state of great agitation over what they describe as a miracle performed on a female farm servant named Marie Raguenes, aged forty, who, after being dumb for twenty-eight years, has suddenly recovered her speech. When she was twelve years of age Marie, as the result of a fright, was stricken dumb, and from that day, in spite of the efforts of numerous specialists, and all sorts of pretended remedies, she was unable to utter a word. On Wednesday last, however, to the great astonishment of her fellow servants assembled at the mid-day meal, Marie articulated clearly the words, "I can speak. Give me some bread."

THE VERY LATEST NEWS GULLED FROM ALL OVER THE WORLD. A daring bank robbery of \$25,000 perpetrated in Glasgow. Prof. Edmond Noard, one of the best known laborators of the late M. Pasteur, died to-day at Paris. Profane abuse was hurled at President Roosevelt as he and his family drove to Christ church at Oyster Bay on Sunday. Mme. Melles will come to America this autumn for a concert tour, and will appear in most of the principal cities of United States and Canada. Charles Mortimer, an accountant, was sentenced at Exeter assizes, England, to twelve months imprisonment for the manslaughter of his wife, an invalid. She died of starvation. The annual meeting of the Anglers' Association of the St. Lawrence River will be held on Wednesday at Lotus Hotel, St. Lawrence Park, the members will be guests of the proprietor, George Seiple, Watertown. Mrs. Samuel Parker, Honolulu, has been robbed of a quantity of jewelry, consisting chiefly of diamonds, rubies and solitaire studs. She wore the jewels at a reception held to signalize the opening of a new hotel. Herbert H. Lake, Watertown, N.Y., has begun action against James Stinson Clute to recover \$10,000 for the alienation of the affections of the plaintiff's wife, Alice M. Lake, who committed suicide, July 7th. Behind times and running at a high rate of speed, a southbound car on the Indianapolis & Martinsville Interurban road, at Indianapolis, crashed into a northbound car near Mooresville, injuring over thirty people, two of them probably fatally. The lord mayor of Liverpool, W. W. Rutherford, and the lady mayors, recently entertained 9,249 "faithful" citizens who had served under the same employer for twenty years or more. At each guest was presented an illuminated address acknowledging the obligations of the general community to the recipient.

A BRILLIANT REVIEW. Of Independent Guards Was Held At Ottawa. Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 3.—The independent guards of Quebec city, Hull and Ottawa, about 300 strong, were reviewed this afternoon by Lord Minto at the government house grounds. The affair was a brilliant one, the varied uniforms of the different corps going to make up a picture of animated beauty. The governor-general was attended by Major Maude, military secretary; Capt. Graham, A.D.C., and Capt. Bell, A.D.C., all three regimental in the uniform of the Cold Stream Guards, their home regiment. The Countess of Minto and children of the vice-regal household were also present, as were Mayor Cook, the aldermen and a large concourse of people. At the conclusion Lord Minto, addressing the officers of the different units, warmly congratulated them on the soldierly bearing of their men. Proceeding to the review at government house, the guards were reviewed at the city hall by Mayor Cook and the aldermen. They also paid their respects to Mr. Shaarretti, apostolic delegate.

A FIERCE HURRICANE. Washes Away Deck Load And Injures The Vessel. St. John, N.B., Aug. 3.—The Nova Scotia schooner Stratheona, Capt. Gerald, has arrived here, and reports having encountered a hurricane of four hours' duration on July 24th. While on the way from Barbados to St. John with molasses, the furious winds and enormous waves struck the vessel while passing along the southern edge of the gulf stream and beside the loss of forty casks of molasses, the schooner's bowsprit and deck timbers were carried away and her sails were badly damaged.
