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TRY FOR CUP WILL COST LIPTON BIG POT OF MONEY.

An Orangeville Man Goes To San Francisco—Will Try To Swim The Niagara Rapids—Chopped Down A Record.

It is said that Jockey Winkfield will ride for the Kewee stable at Saratoga. Kid McCoy has again announced his retirement from the ring, and he probably means to keep his word.

Halifax defeated Philadelphia for the first time in twenty years at Halifax, by 212 and 100 to 141 and 122. New York will be represented in the Canadian swimming championships at Ottawa. Joe Wilson of Toronto, will be a competitor.

The Canadian Amateur Athletic Union will, in all probability, decide to hold the annual championships meet in Montreal, on September 19th, instead of in Toronto.

At the Salt Lake, Utah, bicycle track, Redman brothers clipped six seconds off the world's record in a five-mile amateur race, covering the distance in 9.54.

Jesse Hale, the outfielder loaned by the Toronto club, to Schenectady, of the New York State League, is in the hospital at Schenectady, dangerously ill with typhoid fever.

Trondequoit was launched on Thursday, and towed to moorings, Strathcona taking her place in shipyard. Measurements of both yachts are completed, except the mainmast.

It is figured that it will cost Sir Thomas Lipton 800,000 for this year's try at the cup, and that the American contenders will have to spend nearly 800,000 to foil the gallant Irishman.

The cricket match between Philadelphia and the garrison team at Halifax, ended in a draw, the garrison team running up a score of 295 in the first innings, the visitors lost three wickets for 136.

The lacrosse match between Wallaceburg and D. A. C., at the latter's grounds, broke up in a row at mid of second quarter. Score two to two.

Lally, of Cornwall, refused to show up the job, or King was substituted, and Wallaceburg lacked.

J. W. Glenister, New York, will attempt to swim the Niagara rapids some time this month. Captain Nat. Webb, an English swimmer, attempted "the same feat a few years ago and lost his life. Glenister is confident he can accomplish the task.

The street railway employees concluded their annual sports this morning, the last item for the programme being a tug-of-war between teams captained by Fred Vanorder and Alex. McAdoo. The ex-police man's team proved the better and won easily.

Tiny Henry, the once illustrious cover-point, a member of an Orangeville family that has given six brothers to the game, leaves for San Francisco to-day. He is to manage a large surgical instrument warehouse, and may participate in the lacrosse revival at the Golden Gate.

The announced transfer of the \$50,000 Scholarship from the Presbyterian fund, of J. R. Hagen to Dr. Bell's fund of W. C. Whitney, makes possible the actual ownership of this celebrated house. Naturation is owned jointly by these two wealthy trustees, and by agreement Hagen had the former's service this year. Next year is Whitney's inning, and many of the celebrated mace of La Belle farm will be bred to him in 1904.

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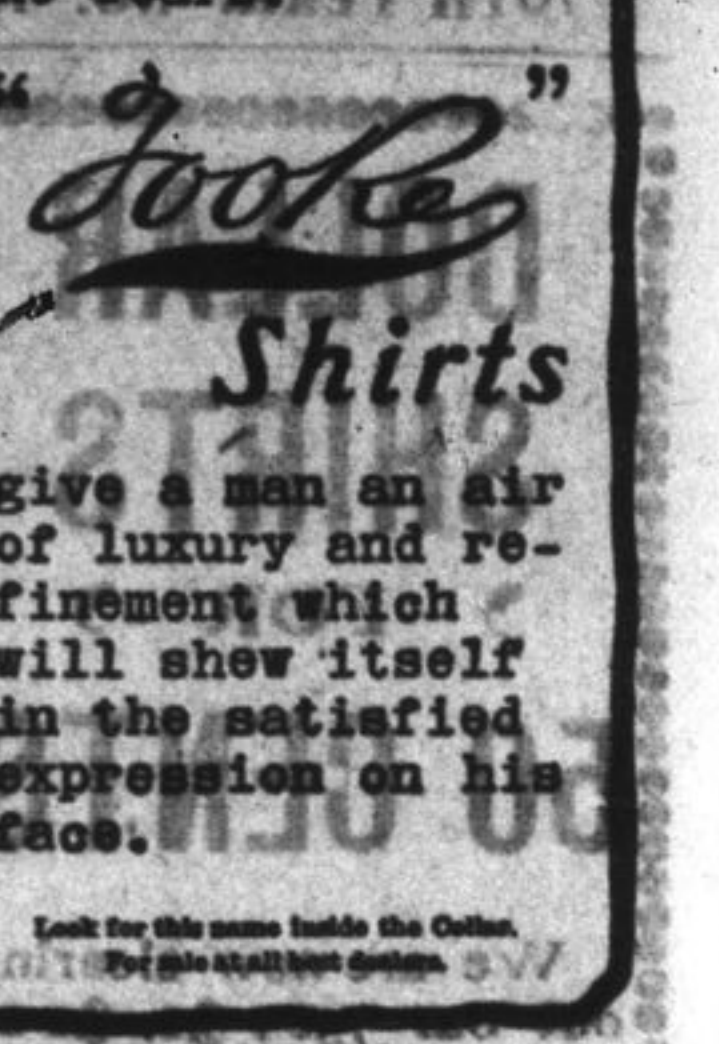
