TWO SISTERS SUICIDE. Extraordinary Spectacle On a Berlin Street.

Berlin, Aug. 14.—A double suicide which occurred recently in Luetzow Strasse, one of the main streets of the west end of Berlin, has created a profound sensation. Two sisters, named Gutwisch, one forty-three and the other forty-five years of age, took a room one afternoon in a well known pension. One was a teacher and the other a portrait painter, and things have gone ill with them for some time past.

The excuse they made when the lady of the house asked for money on account made her suspicious, and hearing excited talk in the room later in the evening she tried to get in, but found the door locked.

A crowd collected, and, fearing what might happen if the ladies fell three stories into the street, some one suggested spreading out some beds on the pavement. Beds not being forthcoming, the house porter brought out a carpet, but the crowd had not the courage to look up the four corners.

One sister then jumped out of the window and the other immediately followed her, they fell on the granite pavement side on their faces, one being killed outright, while the other died shortly afterwards, fearful injuries being received.
