Superintendent of the Bible Society Writes About The Terrible Distitution That Existed in the North of China. New York, Sept. 3.—C. F. Gammon, superintendent of the American Bible Society of North China, thus writes to the society concerning the distress caused by the recurrence of a dire famine in that region.

FOUND AT BARRIE. A Forger And a Runaway From His Family.

Barré, Ont., Sept. 3.—E. B. Steger, who came here from Washington some weeks ago with a young woman who claimed to be his wife, was placed under arrest, by local officers, acting on telegrams, which stated that Steger was wanted in Washington for the forgery of a cheque for \$400 and \$500, for desertion, his wife and child in that city. Steger claimed that he was not the man wanted, though he admitted that his name was Steger, but he went back to Washington with an officer who had come for him, without fighting extradition. His companion, who is said to be a stenographer from Washington, accompanied him.

DRUNKEN VAGABONDS. Detroit, Sept. 3.—A man giving the name of Charles Rich walked into police headquarters yesterday and said he wished to give himself up as a drunkard. He is an elderly man, Wilmes, the four-year-old boy found murdered and his body terribly slashed, several days ago. Rich was later released after being examined by Capt. McDonnell, who said the confession was a drunken vagary.

THE RACE IS ON. New York, Sept. 3.—At eleven o'clock the start of the yacht race was postponed owing to poor weather conditions. The wind was five miles from the north-west.

DIED OF STRANGULATION. Buffalo, Sept. 3.—John Kalf, forty-five years of age, a patient at the Buffalo State Hospital, died yesterday of strangulation. Kalf became violent and was placed in a straight jacket. Kalf's struggles in the jacket worked one of the straps tightly about his neck. With his hands strangled to his sides Kalf was unable to help himself and strangled.

DIED FROM INJURIES. Toronto, Sept. 3.—Mr. Mary Spence died early this morning of injuries sustained by being thrown to the pavement on Saturday night, while getting on a street car. She was a widow, aged forty-seven, and leaves three daughters.

PROGRESS WITH BILL.

The Second Reading Adopted Without Debate. Ottawa, Sept. 2.—Following the heavy work and little progress of the last few weeks in connection with the railway resolution the house made a decided advance this morning, by passing the resolution through committee and adopting the second reading of the government bill, without debate and going into committee thereon. This rapidity was unexpected, and it only leaves the committee stage and the third reading to dispose of the whole matter. Clause 2, which provides for the ratification of the agreement with the railway, was debated all day, much of the old ground being fought over again.

MISSING FROM HOME. Restaurant Keeper is Nowhere to Be Found.

Ottawa, Sept. 3.—On Saturday evening A. G. Chamberlain, 243 Bank street, restaurant-keeper, left his house to go to a grocery. His wife has not heard of him since. He had, she says, about fifty dollars on him, and was dressed in his working clothes. A peculiar feature of the case is that a girl who worked in the restaurant has not been seen since the night Mr. Chamberlain left, but Mrs. Chamberlain does not think the absence of the young woman from the restaurant has any connection with Mr. Chamberlain's absence.

AT THE ANNUAL MEETING. St. Thomas, Ont., Sept. 3.—A large number of prominent provincial conservatives are in the city to-day, attending the annual meeting of the provincial association, which is being held in private this afternoon.

FISCAL QUESTION HOLDS ATTENTION. London, Sept. 3.—The demand for tickets is so great to hear Mr. Chamberlain at Liverpool that it is proposed to erect a special building to hold 30,000 people.

SCORPION RAN INTO A STEAMER. New York, Sept. 3.—The Metropolitan line steamer Whitney, bound for Boston, was in collision with the East river yesterday with the gunboat Scorpion. Two holes were driven into the steamer above the water-line, and she put back to her pier, where she discharged her freight and passengers. The Scorpion had a large hole stove in her bow. She proceeded to the navy yard, where she will be laid up for repairs.

TRIED TO GET IN. Oyster Bay, Sept. 3.—A man giving his name as Henry Wellmeyer, was arrested at Sagamore Hill late Tuesday night while making a persistent attempt to see President Roosevelt. The man was armed with a revolver, fully loaded. He was taken to the village and placed in the town prison. Wellmeyer was declared to be insane. He will be placed immediately in a sanitarium.

TO LAY OUT THE LINE. Winnipeg, Sept. 3.—Ten surveyors for the Grand Trunk Pacific are in Yorkton, N.W.T., and will start on the trail line, thence in a north-westerly direction at once. Other parties also will be put on the work, and it is expected the location will be pretty well completed from Winnipeg to the coast within a year.

DEATH OF A FAMOUS MAN. Montreal, Sept. 3.—Joseph Poiras, aged forty-six, died suddenly while driving in the city to-day. He was one of the best known characters in Montreal and kept a restaurant known as the "Little Windsor," a famous cast end resort.

NEW TRIAL FOR KNAPP REFUSED. Hamilton, Ont., Sept. 3.—Judge Bledsoe has refused a new trial for Alfred A. Knapp, the self-confessed murderer of two of his wives and three other victims. The court fixed December 12th for the execution.

SYSTEM DISARRANGED. Niagara Falls, N.Y., Sept. 3.—A crash in the north end yards of the N.Y.C. RR. between Erie and Lehigh Valley freight trains, early this morning, resulted disastrously, in that the wire stretching system, controlling all of the switches in this big yard, was put out of business. The switch tower, in which the levers are operated, was moved a distance of ten feet by being struck by a derailed freight car.

DEAL CONSUMMATED. Cleveland, Ohio, Sept. 3.—State Fair Commissioner A. F. Perren has sold his black gelding, Equity, 2:12; to C. K. G. Billings for \$10,000. This is the fourth successive sale Mr. Perren has made, receiving for the animals the sum of \$23,000, which he claims to be a record for amateurs.
