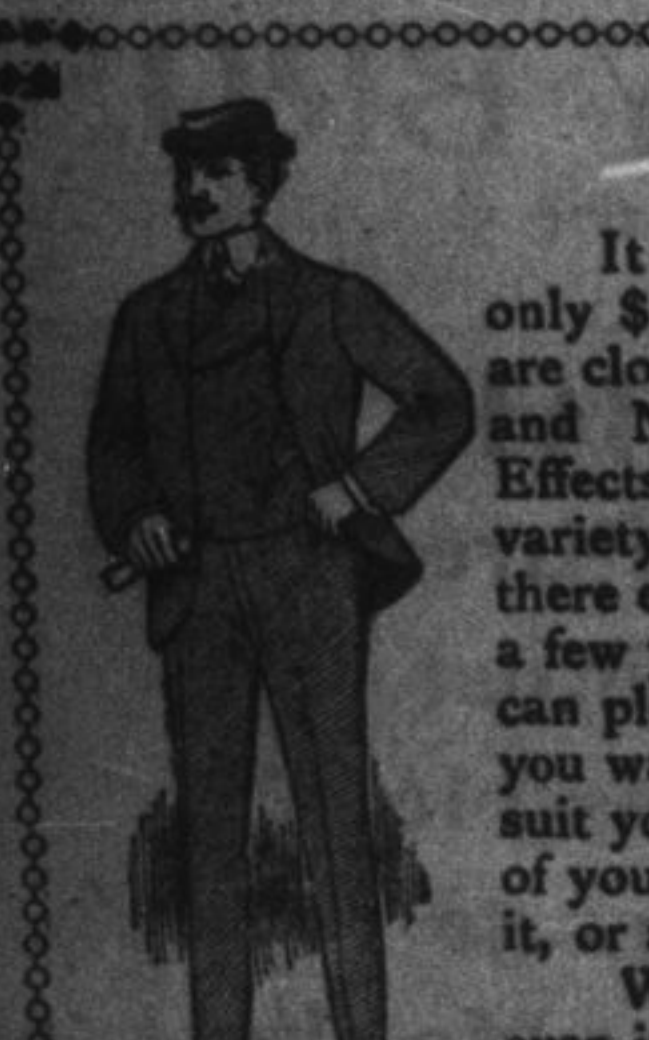

WIFE'S DREAM.

IT WAS REALISTIC AND QUITE TRUE

Her husband had driven to the Philadelphia market with a load of produce, and Mrs. Shedaker had gone to bed, when she dreamed that her husband had been struck by a train and injured.

The dream was so realistic that Mrs. Shedaker awoke with a shudder, and she was unable to sleep again.
