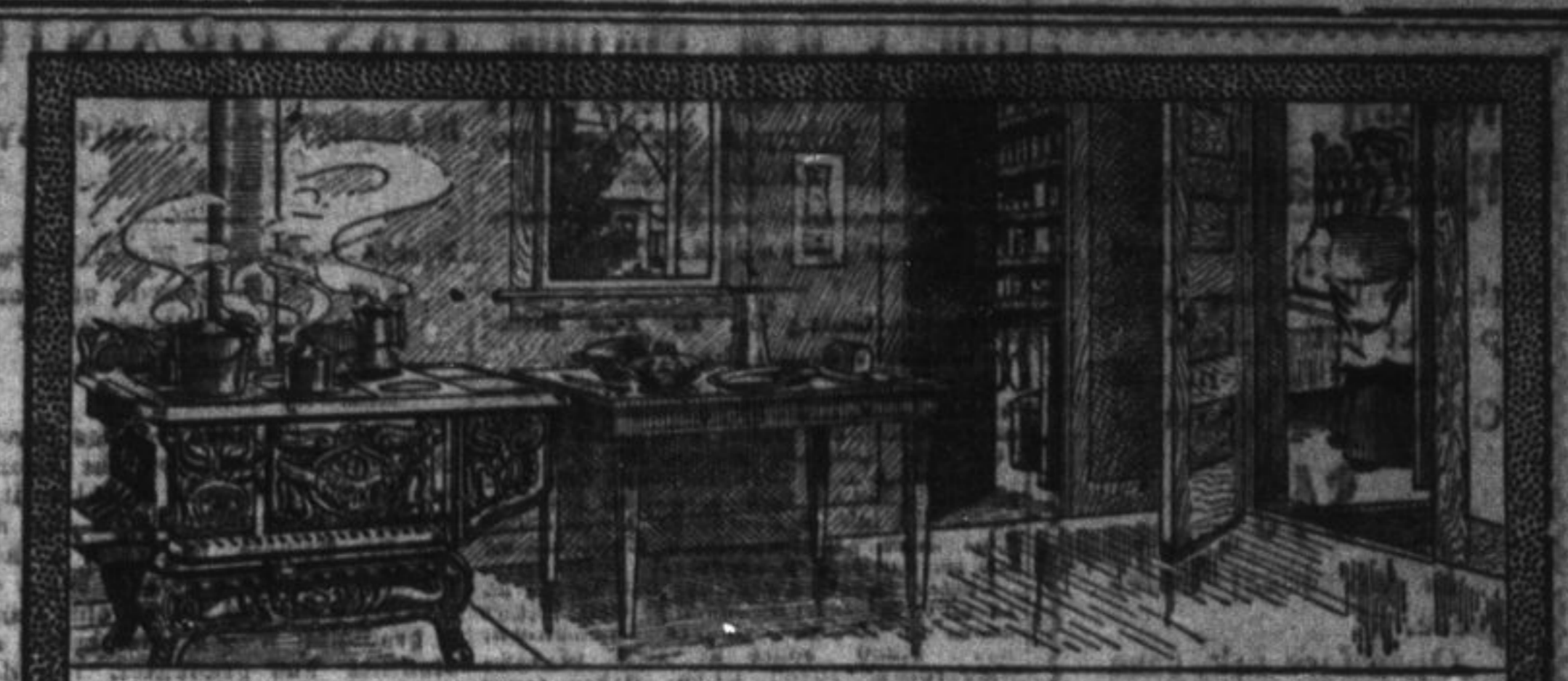

The Quotations From Various Big Centres. Montreal, Sept. 14.—About 300 head of butchers' cattle, 50 calves, and 500 sheep and lambs were offered for sale at the East End Abattoir today. There was a good demand, and slightly higher prices for good to prime cattle, but the common stock were dull of sale. Lambs were scarce and higher in price. Fat hogs were also higher in price. Shippers bought all the large steers on the market, paying from 4c. to 4 1/2c. per pound. Good medium steers sold at about 4c.; ordinary medium at about 3 1/2c., and the common stock at from 2 1/2c. to 3c. per lb.; while the small hells sold at about 2c. per lb. Grass-fed calves sold at from 2 1/2c. to 3c. per lb; good veals brought from 4c. to 4 1/2c. per lb. Sheep sold from 3c. to 3 1/2c. and lambs at from 3 1/2c. to 4c. per lb.
