AUSTRIAN WARSHIPS

Being Fitted Out to Sail For Turkey. London, Sept. 16.—A correspondent of the Times says that while journeying from Salonica to Adrianople, he saw a number of Turkish peasants picked up on the way to join the colors.

It is stated that Russia and Austria, with the concurrence of the other powers, have made very serious representations to Turkey, in regard to the atrocities that are being committed in Macedonia, while, it is said, they threaten to transform Vilayets of Monastir and Adrianople into complete deserts.

It is reported that an order has been sent by telegraph to the navy yard at Pola, to make arrangements to fit out at once, the Austrian warships Majuba, Arpad, Wien, Switzer, Panther, and Marsat, and that they are now ready to sail, presumably for Turkish waters.

Schooner Moonlight Lost. Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Sept. 16.—The schooner Moonlight, belonging to the Gibraltar fleet, foundered twelve miles off Michigan Island in Sunday's great gale on Lake Superior.

She Was Acquitted. Windsor, Ont., Sept. 16.—Horn, yesterday, dismissed the charge preferred by J. W. Hawkins against Eva St. Louis who it was claimed attempted to poison cattle, belonging to complainant, by placing Paris green in their feed.
