

The Pennsylvania railroad has ordered 50,000 young locust trees, which are to be set out this fall on land owned by the company, and it is the intention that the policy thus begun of raising timber for the use of the road will be continued by the planting of additional trees each year hereafter. Some experimental work has been done along the middle division

flourishing comdition. The company owns a large number of tracts of lands at various points along its lines, where, in purchasing rights of way, it has been necessary to buy more land than was needed PROTECT YOUR for the tracks. Some of the farms thus bought have been leased and are VALUABLES occupied by tenants; but in many cases where the soil is suitable for the cultivation of the locust, it is the intention of the company to terminate the leases which are now in force. 
