

Country is Ready For War-Preparations for Mobilization of The Army Are Complete-Feeling That a Conflict Cannot be Averted. Sofia, Bulgaria, Sept. 25.-Notwith-

standing reports to the contrary, perfect tranquility prevails throughout Bulgaria, There is not the slightest outward evidence that the country is on the verge of war. The feeling, however, is steadily growing that war is the sole solution to the Macedonian problem, the only question being whether it will come this autumn or postponed until spring. The preparations for the mobilization of the Bulgarian army have been carried out with singular completeness and a declaration of war will find the Bulgarians sufficiently prepared. The details of atrocities by the Turkish troops in Monastir daily reaching the Bulgarian government equal and even exceed hose already published.

DIGGING FOR MILLIONS.

Another Long Search On The CAUGHT NEAR SELKIRK ON Treasure Island Fails.

Previous attempts to find the buried two years, less one day, in the promillions have been numerous. In November, 1897, came the news of Admiral Palliser's expedition in H.M.S. Imperieuse. The admiral was introduced at Victoria, British Columbia, to a man named Hartford, who professed to know the locality of the treasure, and was shipped ostensibly as an interpreter.

Arrived at the island, Admiral Palliser landed 100 sailors, who dug deep trenches in parallel lines six feet apart places indicated by Hartford's chart, but found nothing. Hartford then showed the sailors a cavern in the rocks, which they blew up with dynamite, but without revealing a sign of the six millions pounds in gold, silver and jewels. According to the prospectus of joint stock company formed at Victoria, British Columbia, in December, 1901, to search for the treasure, it consists of two portions. The first was deposited about the year 1821 by British ship which had become a pirate vessel. History gathered from official sources records the capture and trial of the pirates, the execution of the leaders and the imprisonment of f the men. The treasure was very carefully hidden, but no data existed to show its locality, and endeavors even by the released pirates to find it com-

The second treasure was deposited on Cocos island by the British barkentine Mary Dier in or about the year 1835, having been shipped by the Peruvian government from Callao, which city was expecting a bombardment from the naval forces of Chili. The temptation was more than the could stand, and in the night overpowered the guard, slipped the anchor chain, and sailed with the treasure, which was conveyed to Cocos in eleven boat loads. Most of the crew were afterwards captured by the Peruvians and shot.
