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HOW IT WAS.

Divided Government But Not The Party.

A SEVERE LOSS WITH THE RETIREMENT OF CHAMBERLAIN.

But the Party Could Count on His Support As In The Past—Reasons Why Lord Milner Declined To Go Into The Cabinet—Thought He Was Needed in South Africa.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 3.—Colonel George F. Elliott, who to-day succeeded to the command of the Marine Corps in succession to Major-General Charles Heywood, retired, owes his appointment to the gallant service he performed in command of a company of marines at Guantanamo.

He had argued with him that he could not do better in Downing street, but neither had succeeded in convincing the other.

Another Dreadful Massacre of Jews WITH RESERVE

IS THE NEWS GIVEN IN THE PAPERS.

What Was Intended To Be a Massacre Turned Out To Be a Sanguinary Fight—The Streets Were Strewn With Bodies of Jews And Persecutors.

London, Oct. 3.—A despatch to the Chronicle, from Vienna, quotes ser verely, believing that it is grossly exaggerated, a report published in a local paper at Czarnowitz that a massacre of Jews was perpetrated at Mohilev, near Kishinev, on Thursday.

Bands entered the town, says the paper, and assailed the Jews, who were driven to the streets. Three hundred Jews and 100 Christians were killed.

He says that Chamberlain was intended to be a massacre because a sanguinary fight, which was waged with the greatest fury. The streets were strewn with the bodies of Jews and their persecutors.

The British Canadian case before the Alaska tribunal was closed on Friday. The civic committee at Ottawa will recommend the acceptance of the Bell Telephone company's offer.

Premier Balfour is quoted as saying that Mr. Chamberlain agrees with him as to the impracticability of a tax on food.

Lord Milner, who has been in London for some time, has declined the cabinet appointment, and has returned to the continent.

An amalgamation has been arranged of Laird Bros., the ship builders of Birkenhead, and Charles Cammell & Co., the iron and steel manufacturers of Sheffield.

Major Gen. Sir Ian Hamilton, who arrived in Toronto on Friday, inspected the Highlanders, addressed them briefly, and was most enthusiastically received.

Rev. Dean Matheson, Winnipeg, was elected as suffragan for Rupert's Land, to assist Archbishop Machray, primate of Canada, who is in ill-health.

Bishop Newnham, Mooseomin, was elected bishop of the newly made diocese of Saskatchewan.

Trials were paid to the late Mr. Carby by the leaders on each side in the house on Friday. Mr. Marl (Bogot), read affidavits from a number of his constituents, whose names appear upon petitions against the national trans-continental railway bill.

The affidavits set forth that they had never seen the petitions which they were supposed to have signed, and that, instead of being opposed, they were entirely in sympathy with the policy of the government in the matter.

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The Turks, when possible, avoid conflicts with the insurgents and occupy themselves in attacking the non-combatant population, and burning villages. The correspondent points out that the present phase of the Macedonian question is very critical, because, though the immediate danger of war is less evident, decisions must now be taken not only by Austria and Russia, but also by western Europe.

The part Britain will play in the Balkans will be very important and future influence through Asia, France and Italy apparently await the British lead.

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WOMAN SMUGGLER IS KILLED

Russian Widow Shot Near Her Home.

Berlin, Oct. 3.—At a village in Russia, close to the Prussian border a widow who for many years supported herself by smuggling goods and liquor across the German frontier, has been caught and shot.

The woman's operations were successfully carried on with the assistance of one of the Russian border police, who always brought her safely over the lines.

When they attempted to cross the last time at night the pair found the guards on the German side had been expectedly changed.

The new post, observing the smugglers, fired on them, shot the woman dead, and captured the Russian, who, however, managed to escape, and fled across the border.

DEATH FACT IS FULFILLED. Five Young Germans Die Within Year.

Berlin, Oct. 3.—A remarkable compact on the part of five young Germans to die within a year, has just been fulfilled at the village of Liecholz, near Ansburg. Eleven months ago the young men, who were all particularly jovial in temperament and of powerful build, were drinking in a local tavern with the village cemetery keeper.

"We agree to place ourselves in your hands for burial within a year," was their halting pledge to the gravedigger. Four of them died a natural death before the expiration of six months. Last week the fifth died also.

B. C. ELECTIONS. Rallies Held All Over Province Last Night.

Victoria, B.C., Oct. 3.—Final rallies were held all over the province, last night, in preparation for to-day's vote. Premier McBride is on his way to his home in New Westminster from the interior, where he has been campaigning. He is travelling by freight, having missed ordinary means of transportation.

Mr. McBride has not spoken in any one of the four coast cities of Victoria, Vancouver, Nanaimo or Westminster. The polling in the cities will not close until 7:30 p.m., but in the country constituencies it will close at five o'clock.

WOMAN OVER A CENTURY OLD. Occupies Same House In Which She Was Born.

London, Oct. 3.—In a pretty cottage, covered with wisteria at Market Harborough resides Miss Hannah Brown, who was born in 1806 years ago. The woman, who some years back had her garden path tiled to enable her to enjoy a daily promenade, is in fairly good health. She has a happy and contented countenance, and can converse freely. She retains her faculties to a surprising degree, while the natural color in her cheeks is remarkable for one so far advanced in years.

To Punish Offenders. Chatham, Ont., Oct. 3.—The shareholders of the Dominion-CM company, at a meeting held here, decided to wind up the company's affairs and appointed Col. Rankin to consult with the attorney-general of the province with a view to examining the company's origin, and to punish any person guilty of fraud in connection with its organization.

The company was organized at the time of the oil excitement in Raleigh, last January, and glowing prospects were advertised and England as a result of which many purchased stock that is now declared to be practically worthless.

Want Higher Pay. Windsor, Ont., Oct. 3.—The motor men and conductors of the Sandwich, Windsor and Amherstburg street cars, are asking for an increase in wages and have refused a compromise scale offered by the company. The employees, last year, asked for and obtained an increase of five cents per hour, making their pay about sixteen cents.
