Mgr. Kain, St. Louis, is slowly recovering. Report says that fresh outrages are planned in Salonica.

Miss Gertrude H. Wood, a Toronto missionary, died in China. Edward Cream, the popular C.P.R. agent at Quebec, is dead.

Slight shock of earthquake felt in St. Louis, on Sunday night. Ada Bonneau, eight years old, was buried to death at Richmond, Va.

The first encyclical issued by Pope Pius X was entirely religious in tone. Senator Landarkin, died at the family residence, in Hanover, on Sunday. Twelve dwellings in St. Rochs, Quebec, were destroyed by fire. Loss \$15,000.

Mrs. Mary G. Clark, Utica, N.Y., aged seventy-six years, killed on railway. There is a bumper wheat crop, on St. William Van Horn's farm at Selkirk.

James O'Leary, a Chicago pool seller, has just lost \$100,000 on a horse race. It is reported that Turkish and Bulgarian troops are fighting on the frontier.

Vaclav Adak, Cleveland, O., attacked his wife and two children and then cut off her throat.

F. D. Monk opened the conservative campaign in Quebec at Three Rivers, Que. on Saturday.

Owing to widespread distress in Porto Rico thousands of people are emigrating to Mexico.

A large steel bridge of the C.P.R., at Fort William, was wrecked during a severe storm. Loss \$38,000.

Lipton in discussing Chamberlain's scheme at New York, said the British people are not ripe for protection.

Herbert Bowen, wife and son, Richmond Hill, L.L., dashed over an embankment, and were seriously hurt. Connections for Ottawa, on the G. T.R., are now made by the fast train, leaving the city station at 1:10 p.m.

Mayor John H. Broadfoot, Seneca, died in a Chicago hospital, where he had undergone an operation. Major-Gen. Ian Hamilton crossed the lake from Toronto to Niagara on Sunday, in Lieut.-Col. Pollard's steam-yacht.

Rev. Edward J. Kiernan, parish priest of Collingwood, died in England, where he had gone for his health.

Miss Mary Archer received a verdict for \$8,000 in her suit against the Society of the Sacred Heart at London.

Theresa Vaughn, an actress famous for her rich contralto voice, is dead from paresis, at Worcester insane hospital.

Remains of Henry Cargill, M.P., were buried in Kingston, the funeral being one of the largest ever seen in Bruce county.

Rev. Francis Bloodgood Hall, northern New York, is dead. He never accepted any money during the forty years of his ministry.

Chief Justice J. Brewster McCallum, of the supreme court of Pennsylvania, died at Montrose, Pa., after an illness of about two years.

Both sides sustained heavy losses in the fight between Turks and Bulgarians on the frontier. Twenty-four thousand recruits have been called out.

By the king's command a memorial service for Sir Michael Herbert will be held in Marlborough House chapel, adjoining St. James Palace, on Tuesday.

In defence of her life Mrs. Catherine C. Snowden, Chicago, shot and killed her former husband, Henry F. Smith, from whom she had been divorced for two years.

Frank Buchanan, Chicago, has won a victory over Samuel Parks by being elected president of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers.

Disguised as a simple Roman Catholic priest, Monsignor Spigardi, a member of the papal household, has labored among the Italians at St. Louis for eight years.

At a big pow-wow, at Ogdensburg, the St. Regis Indians have decided not to lease Lone Squaw, Green, Williams, and two other islands near the Galopais, to the government.

A. Parent and J. Currier were killed at Montreal, by a trolley line coming in contact with the derrick man. Provoost, who was badly shocked.

The United States government will pay on Tuesday official tribute to the memory of Right Hon. Sir Michael H. Herbert, the late British ambassador to the United States, by a service on Tuesday.

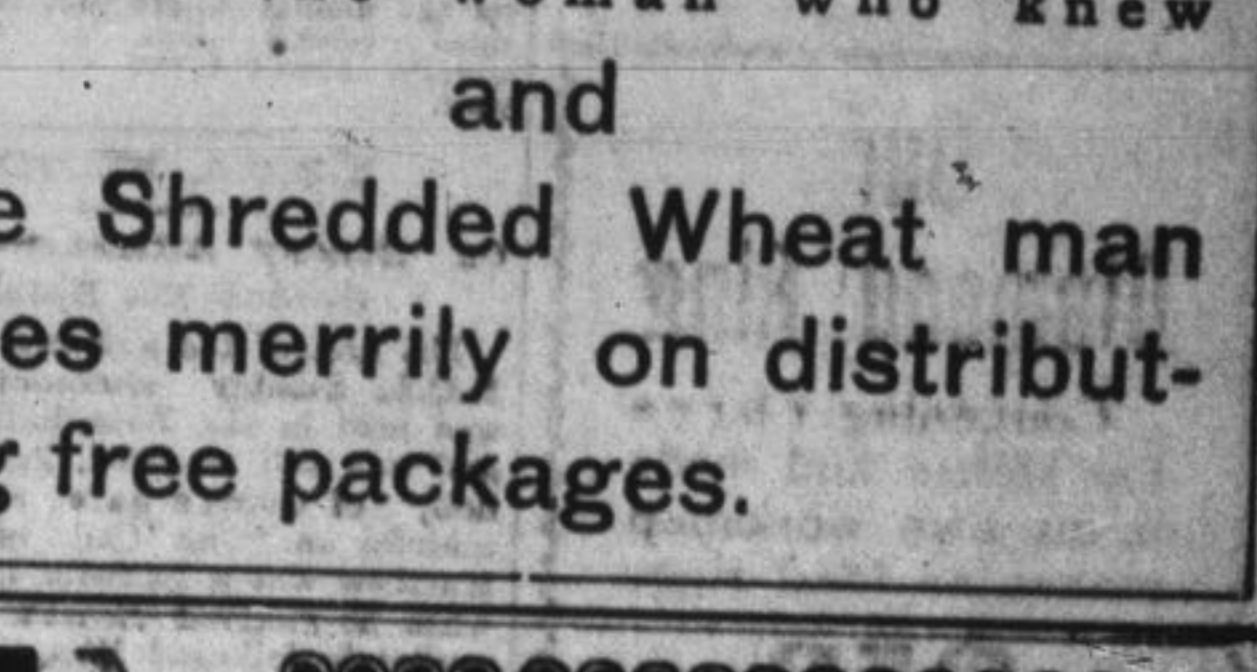
