B. C. PREMIER
SAYS HE HOPES TO CON-
TROL HOUSE.

Wells and Davidson are the Ones
Looked to For Support—
Speakership May be Offered
For Former.
Toronto, Oct. 6.—A Globe, Vancou-
ver, special says: That while Mr. Mc-
Bride's supporters claim the doubtful

importance to organized labor in Can-
ada, inasmuch as an adverse decision
seriously would hamper their present
privileges.

The International Harvester com-
pany, of Canada, limited, the head
office of which will be at Hamilton,
has been incorporated in Ontario. The
business and assets of the J. W.
Mann Manufacturing company, limited,
and the Deering Harvester com-
pany, of Hamilton. The share capital
is placed at \$1,000,000.

The city has received a copy of the
order of the railway committee of the
privy council regarding a bridge over
the G.T.R. and C.P.R. tracks at
Yonge street. The committee directs
that the railways pay the whole cost
of the bridge in equal shares. The city
is to receive compensation for dam-
ages to its property. The bridge is to
be straight and the street is to
be widened. The city engineer's es-
timate is about \$200,000.

FUR FRAUDS
EXTENSIVELY PERPETRATED
IN MONTREAL.

Fur Sweepings Made Into Sale-
able Articles—Buyers Got By
Fraudulent Advertisements—
Warrants Issued For Guilty
Parties.
Montreal, Oct. 6.—Warrants are be-
ing issued to-day for a number of
people who are connected with what is
claimed to be extensive frauds in con-
nection with the fur business, which
involve a sum, roundly estimated at
\$20,000. All kinds of goods were made
up, principally ladies' Persian lamb
jackets and put on the market under
peculiar circumstances by the aid of
advertisements in the city papers. It
was made to appear that a lady going
south was willing to sacrifice her fur
coat. Other similar expedients were
adopted to find buyers. Examination
of these coats showed that they were
made of small particles of fur picked
up around fur establishments from
sweepings, etc., and by dint of much
patient labour, pieced together, and
made into garments of various kinds.
So small were the pieces used that
the goods could not hold together
more than a few days, after the pur-
chasers commenced wearing them. Ex-
amination showed that a regular busi-
ness was being made in that line, a
factory employing several people be-
ing in full swing. The people who oper-
ated the business, had selling agents
in different parts of the city, and a
large and lucrative business was
transacted. Many people have been
defrauded, one of whom recently placed
the matter in the hands of the police,
with the above results.
