### BROADBIRM'S

Letter From Greater New York.

### A GREAT TRIAL

NOW CLOSED—A BURNING DISGRACE.

Broadbirm Objects To Ladies Jumping Hurdles on Horseback—Dowie's Preparations Expensive.

(Special to the Whig, Letter 1,377.)

New York, Oct. 9.—On Friday, October 1st, 1903, a trial was closed, which began at Christmas, 1901, in the death chamber of the states prison at Denamora. This trial has occupied the public attention for two years, and will stand as a burning disgrace to our criminal jurisprudence, as long as courts of justice shall stand in any civilized land. Three brothers of unsavory reputation from their childhood, conspired with a cousin in one of the most heinous assassinations their country has ever known to recall. It was not an ordinary murder, provoked by passion or seeking plunder. It was a cruel, deeply planned assassination of an uncle, every detail perfect, and, having done their shocking work, they hurried back, fifteen miles to their home, glorying in their successful infamy, for which they were not repentant. "The mills of the gods grind slowly" but they grind exceeding small. From the moment their victim fell dying on the floor, till they stood in the chamber of death, escape was impossible, conviction and death certain. A criminal judge in the supreme court, said there could be no other verdict than guilty, yet for two years the shocking details of the trial have been kept before the public and justice impeded on its way to the electric chair. What is the use of a court of appeal? It has been the boast of our jurisprudence that no criminal was ever brought to the bar of justice, but a lawyer was found to defend him. There seems to be a very good reason for a supreme court. Justice in the lower courts is often administered by men who are indifferently acquainted with the law, but to reach the bench of the supreme court, a man must be known to be of high character and of a perfect legal education. Here the criminal has a chance for his life, and an opportunity to prove his innocence if innocent he be, but by means of legal quibbling an attorney of indifferent reputation has an array of objections which paralyze the very things for which courts are instituted, and may possibly at last, defeat the ends of justice. In view of the trial of the Van Wormer boys, the state has been put to enormous expense, and it was as certain as that the day succeeds the night, that the three assassins were equally guilty. They have paid the penalty of their crime, which fortunately for criminal history, has few parallels in our courts of justice.

While looking over my paper the other day, I saw a magnificent caricature of a beautiful lady attempting to leap a fence in the Meadow Brook hunt. The place where she had her obstruction was not sufficiently high for her ambition; she saw a place with an additional rail, and the noble animal she rode, cleared it like a flying bird, thunders of applause greeted the splendid feat, and yet, two years ago, one of our fashionable leaders was killed not a hundred yards away in attempting to do the very thing which this daring equestrienne performed. Then the question arose in my mind, do all human beings possess the right to dispose of their lives as they please? The performer whom I noticed, to-day, was young, beautiful, wealthy; kindly of heart, gentle of spirit, beloved and honored by all who knew her. Had she the right to risk plunging hundreds of those who know her into a sorrow from which there can be no appeal? Last week in the borough of Brooklyn there was a very fine horse show attended by our very best society, and among the features of the evening was some daring high leaping, and one of the contestants was a beautiful young married woman, splendidly mounted, who made the most remarkable leaps of the evening. She had cleared the bar by an honest foot; the building fairly rocked with applause that greeted her, when, quickly wheeling her horse, she made a bold dash, and cleared the bar again. Six times in succession did she repeat that wonderful leap, but that which astonished me almost like a death knell. It was a brutal thing to do; it gratified a petty ambition and it might have sacrificed a human life.

We are a strange admixture here at the present time of politics, religion, honesty, rogues, success and disappointment. Dr. Dowie, evangelist, will reach us in about two weeks, and he promises a Pentecost, though it may lack the fiery tongues. Mighty are the preparations of this coming apostle, all of which cost money. A few weeks ago he placed a barrel on his altar, and told his audience that he needed a half million of dollars and the barrel was half-filled with gold, silver, and even jewelry. His own private car is a palace, and will be occupied by himself, his wife and possibly his son. To insure success beyond the reach of failure, cash advances have been made in every direction for shelter, provisions, printing, railroad transportation, and every other thing. With his will come a supply of about 2,700, and if these trained singers are at all proficient, there will be enough music to make the United Sangerfest crazy, and wish they were in Paradise. Night and day our streets will be patrolled by these soldiers of the cross, and Dowie, has faith to believe that every one of his converts will do his duty. He says distinctly that every dollar expended shall bring a new convert. Test this what he has already done, and you have 500,000—enough to build 1,000 villages with 500 inhabitants each. So far his life work seems to be one continued success. I have

not been able to detect any mistakes, his lace works are among the most promising in the United States and his other industries are equally flourishing. The work which he has now undertaken challenges our admiration on account of its bold and daring character. If he should succeed in any eminent degree, it will mark him as one of the characters which have appeared from time to time and left their impress upon the age.

It was not without a feeling of sadness and some disappointment that I saw the primacy of Hugh McLaughlin, the autocrat of the democratic party of Brooklyn, beaten in the convention which he should have ruled. As a matter of fact, the grim old chieftain has met no serious loss, he has a body guard that stands around him like a wall of steel. In the wave of reform which took place at the previous election, Mr. Groat was the fusion candidate for comptroller; he has never had an important factor in Brooklyn politics, till John Y. McKane, threw down his defiance to the supreme court of New York. He became an assistant to the present Judge Gaynor. From that time he was a steady candidate for any office within the people's gift, and when it became evident that Mr. Coler could not gain a re-nomination, the fusion committee, looking around for a candidate who might be accepted by both parties, happened to strike upon Mr. Groat, who had filled other public offices, and against whom nothing good or bad was known. He was elected, and so far, has served his term satisfactorily. Whether it was a part of a concerted plan or plot, when the conventions were coming on, Mr. Groat made a trip to Europe, which to my way of thinking was done so that he might appear to be out of the way, and to have no hand in the events that followed. In view of his faithful services, he was nominated by the reformers. No doubt he was sincerely grateful for the compliment and pledged himself to support the reformers' ticket. Tammany Hall, looking around for a candidate for comptroller, thought they could find no one else than Mr. Groat, tendered him the nomination, which he very gratefully accepted. When Robert Cutting, chairman of the reform committee, became aware of the fact that Mr. Groat had accepted the Tammany nomination, he came to the conclusion that no man can touch pitch without being defiled, and of all kinds of reform that this city needed, Tammany was the last to be desired. No doubt that Robert Cutting was much amazed, and he sat down and wrote to Mr. Groat that the citizen's committee desired no endorsement from Tammany Hall, and that the political body of a single individual, and he informed Mr. Groat that the reform party had no further use for his services. So they erased his name from among their candidates, and hope to find another who has no Tammany affiliations. On the receipt of Mr. Cutting's letter, Mr. Groat found himself in the uncomfortable position of the man who tried to sit on two stools at once. His attempts could hardly have been considered a pronounced success, for it made sitting down a very uncomfortable process. I understand that Mr. Groat has finally concluded to get the supreme court to issue a mandamus, compelling the reform party to leave his name on the ticket. Mr. Groat, I believe, is a lawyer. I don't know how good a one, but he ought to be good enough to know that the supreme court in this instance will not attempt to control the franchise. The freeman's ballot is the shield of his protection in peace or war; it has cost millions of treasure and Mr. Groat may depend that the supreme court nor any other court instituted in the United States, will ever use its power to compel a party to be protected by a wolf in sheep's clothing. —BROADBIRM.
