CLOSING EVENT OF THE CEREMONIES AT QUEEN'S.

New Mining Building Opened - Promise of Continued Government Support - The Address - Principal Gordon's Closing Remarks. The formal opening of the new physiological and geological building at Queen's took place Friday afternoon, the ceremony taking place in the large physics room in presence of an interested audience.

The Government's Position. Edw. J. B. Pense regretted, especially in the order of speech and congratulatory had been tendered to the state, that Premier Ross and Hon. Mr. Harcourt had been unable to remain for this gathering, because of prior engagements for ceremonies at Kingston and Windsor.

Principal Gordon's Remarks. In closing the ceremonies Principal Gordon thanked the speakers for their attendance at the notable occasion. He hoped that the Premier of Ontario would entrust to Mr. Pense the keeping of his conscience regarding the School of Mining (Laughter). As to the ladies, he was just wondering if they come into the province as well as to the land and see if they could annex mining to the present system of co-education. (Laughter).

The success of the school, he said, was due very much to the assistance of the university. As to the humanities and sciences, he did not see any lines drawn between the two.
