Letter from Greater New York.
AWFUL STORM
DESCRIPTION OF THE UNEXPECTED DELUGE.

Lessoning of Taxation Gratifying—If Murphy Invades Brooklyn, Look Out For Squalls—Beware Of The Editor And Reporter.

Special Correspondence: Letter No. 1,378.

New York, Oct. 16.—The storm that swept down this city on Thursday, October 16, 1903, has had no counterpart in the present generation and will be remembered with horror as the worst that the present generation has known. It was entirely different from any other tornado, storm or tempest within my memory. There was a wild shriek in the remaining hours, as it dashed along in its mad fury, leaving nothing but one broad swath of ruin and disaster in its wake. Wednesday night, when we hoped the tempest would abate its destroying force, it increased to what seemed like the fierce typhoon of one meets at mid-winter on the dread Indian sea, that which was heavy rain on Wednesday night was on Thursday a destructive power which no human being could stop, or avenge. It was not long till the people high and low, rich and poor, were compelled to realize how dependent we are on the outside world for that which should be the first prayer to God in leaving the city in better condition than it had been before in many a day. To better understand the effect of the storm in New York city, we will take a short view of our market place when we arose on Thursday morning, we found that the baker, who is as faithful as the sun, had not called and the milkman, our faithful servant for many a day, was not heard from; in due time the butcher came, but he had no meat. Railroad trains were things of the past and apparently, there was no daily bread for our population, to thank God for. It was a general day of fasting, but I regret to add it was heavy with curses instead of prayers. Human nature is pretty much the same in every portion of the globe and there is one fact that tells the whole story in a nutshell and that is: "A very good man can make a very bad man if you were him to fight on an empty stomach."

There seems to be a turmoil in our public affairs of which no present investigation can give a reasonable forecast. The political fight was opened Saturday night by Mayor Low, Frederick W. Hendricks, the new candidate for comptroller and several other gentlemen who are pillars of reform in the coming battle for pure government.

Mayor Low's disposition of his future course may be determined by his actions in the past; as he can govern in a measure the character of the man whom he will call to his assistance, he may be judged by the men who have shared with him in the government of New York in the past. One of the gratifying evidences of his work, as found in the lessoning of our taxation, I have a very vivid remembrance of how my taxes stood in the past and you must remember, my dear friends, that facts are stubborn things. In 1887 the taxes on my house amounted to \$125, an amount which a gentleman who has derived his knowledge from a reliable source that my taxes will now be \$75, instead of \$125 as they were years ago. This is a gratifying result and one that is due to the attention of every citizen, who has a voice in the coming election.

Just think of how many comforts to a family this \$50 would bring if used for the national of going into the pockets of gamblers and political thieves. The reformers seem to be on the right track and their hope of success in the coming election is based on the fact that Tammany Hall is going to open a new headquarters in the borough of Brooklyn, completely ignoring the primacy of Hugh McLaughlin, whose political challenge has not been questioned during a period of forty years. During the absence of power of Mr. Croker in Tammany Hall he never dared to cross the river to Brooklyn, or to raise a pole on which was a liberty cap to which every loyal democrat was expected to hoist, but now Hugh McLaughlin is made of that stubborn stuff which bows to no man's cap. He bows in submission to God alone and allows no man to question his democratic faith. I hardly think the news is true, that Mr. Murphy is to invade Brooklyn; but if it is, look out for squalls.

I saw in a newspaper the other day, that Sam Parks, who had been out to Kansas City, to view a body of steel workers which owed his party their sole allegiance, having finished his work in Kansas City, was coming to New York to lick several editors and reporters, who had said a number of unkind things about him. I don't know much about steel workers, but I do know a good deal about editors and reporters, and if Mr. Parks will take my advice he had better make his last will and testament, before he comes, or let out the job instead of fighting the battle himself. I know this as a hard fact, that the reporter who would let Sam Parks lick him would be fired out of the press club so fast that he would not know whether he was on his head or his heels. The Press club has in its membership a half dozen good hard, heavy-weight fighters, whose business it is to see that which falls to one of the less pugnacious members of the club. They are always ready for a scrap, and are not afraid to tackle either Currier or Jefferson, so, Mr. Parks had better keep his weather eye open, for when he

(talks of licking an editor, or a reporter, he is trading on dangerous ground. I don't know whether our worthy president is going to walk around the world with a whip on his shoulder, inviting somebody to knock it off, but it looks very much that way, for he desires congress to make an immediate appropriation for the building of five battleships and a large number of ocean fighters of different degrees, so that when the time for war is actually upon us we will not be caught dead or sleeping. He has evidently been studying the admission of the immortals Washington "in time of peace prepare for war."

If there is one entertainment lighter than another, it is the spending of other peoples' money, and after the pleasure of spending yourself, the next degree is the telling of the owner how to dispose of it. There are two men, who stand forth in bold relief, occupying a large space in the public eye. One of them is supposed to be the richest man on the earth. The other, though not so rich, is not exceedingly poor. John D. Rockefeller is the name of the richest and the other is the name of the poorer. Mr. Rockefeller's wealth is counted in millions that you can hardly count it. Life with him has got to be a heavy burden all on account of his riches. William R. Grace finds no difficulty in disposing of his fortune comfortably, yet he does more than most men in his limited fortune than John D. Rockefeller does with his hundred millions. Mr. Rockefeller eases his mind by building and founding libraries. Mr. Grace, on the other hand, is a collector of books, and his learning is different from that of Mr. Rockefeller's. He has founded a college, in the State of Pennsylvania, where great encouragement is given to those who are learning to be good and happy of mankind. It is a college for women exclusively, it teaches how to make home look like what a home ought to be. For five cents a day, a girl can be taught the science of cooking, and the art of making the most of her money, and the art of making the most of her time. It teaches a woman how to make her dresses, and in short it teaches them by degrees in every possible way how to get the highest degree of comfort at the lowest cost. Here is a college worthy of a good man's attention and this good work Mr. Grace conducts at his own expense. For three years the college has been in successful existence. No sooner does a girl receive her diploma than there are dozens of families waiting for the scholar from that college, for they know that their homes will be properly taken care of. Type-writing and short-hand are taught in this college. Its graduates are treated with the greatest respect by families that can afford themselves of their services. This college encourages independence, honesty and good feeling between the employer and the employed. I hear their names spoken of with a "God speed." I wish there were a thousand more such colleges in the United States. Think of it, Andrew Carnegie! Reflect upon it, John D. Rockefeller! Throw a few of your loose millions into a college for cooks! Get rid of your dyspepsia, and live long enough to see the bright sunlight giving warmth and light to a grateful world. Do this John. Try it, Andrew, and the bread you may have cast upon the troubled waters may return after many days.


