A PIPING HEAVY ITEM.

The amount set apart for streets and walks and drains by the city council this year was \$12,000, and nearly one-half of it was applied in the cleaning of streets. This fact suggests closer consideration. The mud must be removed every spring for the reason that it is a nuisance and contains the germs of disease. But its removal is too costly when one half of the appropriation for the year goes for this purpose. Two thoughts follow—that the methods of cleaning should be carefully scanned to the end that they may be improved if possible, and that the streets may be surfaced with something better than limestone, which goes to dust and mud within a year. Paving should be resorted to, gradually, annually, until at least all the business streets have been put in a condition that requires less expenditure of money. That the cleaning alone should absorb half of the whole sum at the disposal of the works department is a circumstance which impresses both ratepayer and aldermen.

THE TALK OF APPEAL.

New light has been thrown upon the participation of Gagey in the Muskoka election. It is afforded by Mr. Arnold, of Bracebridge, and is to the effect that Gagey was asked to address the electors as an appeal from the judgment of Justices Boyd and Falconbridge, who composed the royal commission. RIEUAU WARD ELECTORS.

To Form An Association—Want Other Wards Organized. The thin edge of the wedge has been entered, and it rests with the ratepayers at large to drive it home. A meeting of some of the heavier ratepayers of Rieuau ward was held last evening at the home of Dr. Brown, for the purpose of considering the advisability of forming an association of property owners of the ward for mutual protection. This question was freely discussed, and the unanimous opinion expressed that it was necessary to organize the property holders, so as to procure suitable aldermen, and to see that the ward receives its just expenditure. An energetic committee will follow the lead set by Rieuau ward, and organize similar associations in other wards.

The Ontario Churchman, issued in excellent form by the Deseronto News company, recently announced its intention of early discontinuance. This was sincerely regretted by the bishop and many of the clergy, and they have asked the British Whig to revive the useful publication, under pledge of a better support. An energetic effort has, therefore, been undertaken and two numbers, one for Advent and one for Christmas, will be issued to complete the present year.

DISEASE IN THE AIR.

In Hamilton the board of health has taken an important step in regard to the sale of meat. It has passed a by-law and the council has given its concurrence to the effect that meat, shall not be carried or carted through the city without a covering. The idea is that the germs of disease, in the dust, are wafted about by the breeze, and that articles of food should be protected from them. The meat, especially, should be covered by the street, and kept away from any opening in shop or building which the dust may penetrate. The argument that such laws and such precautions did not exist in other days and that our ancestors were a hardy race will not do. The world is advancing and knowledge and discovery are advancing with it. It is clear that germs of disease are in the air. Such being the case the legislation of cities which makes for the public health should be radical and progressive. Hamilton has led in a very commendable way in one respect.

Matters That Interest Everybody

Notes From all Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered by the Public.

The Ottawa fair receipts were \$57,185, and the expenditures \$56,775.

One hundred and twenty south Russian agriculturists sailed for Canada.

The Dominion Coal company will open three new mines at Glace Bay, N. S.

One of the new buildings at Cornell University, has been named after Goldwin Smith.

Perceptible earthquake shocks were noted throughout Missouri, Tennessee and Illinois.

Robert, the nine-year-old son of Joseph McKay, was kicked by a horse at Manila, Ont., and killed.

The recent floods stopped Armagh spinning mills, and six looms collapsed in Drogheda, Ireland.

The Hamburg American liner Arcadia, will land three hundred immigrants at Halifax to-day.

At the motor speed trials at Southampton, Eng., E. Hutton made a speed of eighty miles an hour.

John Redmond stands to gain £8,000 by the sale of his Wexford estate at the zone prices under the land act.

A despatch from Matane denies the rumor that Dr. Ross, M.P. for Rimouski, will resign to accept a government position.

An order-in-council was passed by the Ontario government appointing Frank Hunt police magistrate of the county of Elgin.

F. H. Clergue now in London with Senator Dandurand, says Canada is to know first of developments regarding the Soo works.

By an explosion in a United States government explosive storage building on Iona Island, in the Hudson, six men were killed and six injured.

Two members of the Armenia central committee were shot and mortally wounded by a fellow-countryman, who afterwards committed suicide.

A young man named Paul was killed by an explosion on the dredge J. J. Israel, in Lake St. Peter, and several others of the crew were injured.

Eugene Clark, a reporter for the C.P.R. at Calgary, N.W.T., was killed, Wednesday afternoon. He was repairing a car and another car was shunted against it.

The necessity of the marriage laws in Quebec province has been again illustrated. The Roman Catholic church has separated a man and wife because they were second cousins.

In the French colony of Madagascar the report of a rebel has been found. Seven bullocks and seven francs, a fine of ten oxen and ten francs is inflicted for selling or for distilling alcohol.

Several merchants in Brandon, N. W.T., have been visited by forged checks, bearing a local contractor's name. The forgers are supposed to be belonging to a gang of returning harvesters, and are still at large.

The report is again revived that Mr. W. H. M.A. will ere long, receive the appointment of judge, vice Justice White, of Sherbrooke, whose retirement with an allowance is said to have been decided upon.

At the fall assizes at Winnipeg, on Wednesday, the grand jury presented a true bill against Lucas Kyrk, for the murder of Paul Wojciechowski. The trial was set for Monday of next week.

Goldwin Smith Honored.

The board of trustees of Cornell University have adopted this resolution: "That in grateful recognition of the illustrious services rendered by Prof. Goldwin Smith to our nation, particularly by his defence of the cause of American union and liberty in Great Britain during the period of the civil war, and also to this university, which, beginning with its foundation, he has honored by his acceptance (while declining compensation) of appointments as professor and lecturer and which, besides, he has made the object of gifts of great value to scholars, the trustees ordain that the new hall for the college of arts, and whose faculty Goldwin Smith is still professor emeritus, he hereby designate the Goldwin Smith Hall."

Of Ancient Date.

People who suppose "tarring and feathering" is an invention of Judge Lynch, "out west," may be surprised to learn, that it was first used by Richard Coeur de Lion. In the regular command, decrees, amongst other punishments, that whoever in either of their two armies should commit theft, was to have warm pitch poured over his head, which should then be covered with feathers, and the offender be abandoned on the first shore.

AT THE POLICE COURT.

Young Man To Be Examined As To His Sanity.

William Meagher, "cut up monkey shines" in the Hotel Dieu last evening and had to be taken out by the police and locked up in the cells. He had a mania for murder, and threatened to kill off all the patients and attendants in the institution. At the police court this morning he was sent back on remand and will be examined as to his sanity.

Michael O'Neill admitted that he was under the influence of liquor when arrested, and was ordered to pay a fine of \$3 and costs.

Ellen O'Neill again occupied a place in the dock, and wept bitterly. Here is a sad, heart-rending case. A week or two ago she ran away from Montreal from a brutal husband. In a local restaurant she met a man who feignedly represented matters and persuaded her to go with him. Discovering his villainy, she fled and sought protection at the Salvation Army barracks. There her condition was such that it was considered expedient to land her over to the police. She spent a week in jail, and was later sent to the Home for Friendless Women and O'Hildren. Last evening she rebelled against the class of work assigned her, and the police were asked to remove her from the institution, which they did, leaving her three-months-old baby behind. The magistrate this morning committed her to jail for three months.

The woman has a refined appearance and does not bear the imprint of a dissolute character; her manner tells one that she has been better days. She said she did not mind going to jail, but that she had been given back her baby, the loss of which caused her not only mental agony but physical suffering. The woman's offence, if it can be traced that she has committed a crime, is so insignificant that her punishment seems to be beyond reason.

Coffee and tea were dispensed in the dining-room by Mrs. Macnee and Mrs. T. C. Wilson, Miss Leta Wilson and a number of bright little girls, Miss Norah Macnee, Miss Eleanor Phelan and Miss Margery Brownfield taking very good care that everyone had refreshments. It is small wonder that the hard-working ladies, who give up so much time and thought to the charitable work of the Infants' Home, are very pleased indeed with the gratifying result of their latest effort.
