

Beautiful Weather Prevails-One Farmer's Loss.

Alameda, Assa., Nov. 3.-(To the Editor): We are having the most delightful weather imaginable- ideal September <weather. After all, the threshing is completed. It is now over four weeks since we had a storm. There is very little more threshing to be done in this vicinity; a few acres of flax here and there is all.

As yet this station has had a plentiful supply of cars to haul the grain east, and the good car supply is general over the west. Very little grain has been marketed, however, as the farmers are all busy ploughing. Quite a little frosted wheat has been shipped to Fort William, as the owners were not satisfied with the prices offered here. One car-load was shipped from here and it was so very bad that no elevator would touch it in Fort William; so after ten days' demunnage was allowed to run on it. the C. P. ordered it dumped into the lake. The farmer had to pay the freight on the car-load, and also
