HE CAUSED STIR

HIGGS-BEECH HAS GIVEN RISE TO CONJECTURE.

Chamberlain's Plans—After His Speech-Making Tour He Will Consider Problems. London, Nov. 16.—Sir Michael Hicks-Beach's speech at Bristol has given rise to the most contradictory rumors. On the one hand, it is said that he and the free food party have captured Mr. Balfour, and will check the tendency to go over to Mr. Chamberlain, while on the other hand it is claimed that Mr. Balfour has done the capturing, and that the Free Food League, in losing its leader, will disappear. The matter will be decided on the 24th, when the league will hold a public meeting, at which the Duke of Devonshire will be the chairman, and Sir Michael Hicks-Beach and Lord Goschen will be the principal speakers. Mr. Chamberlain will address a great meeting at Cardiff next Friday. He is inundated with invitations to speak at every great centre of population, but announces that after his London speech early in the year he will devote his time to the mature consideration of the intricate problems which have arisen in connection with his policy. A post card which has aroused considerable enthusiasm has been distributed broadcast over the country. It contains a red picture of Mr. Chamberlain, and the inscription, "What Saith the Scripture?" (Genesis, chapter 41, verse 55). The verse referred to is as follows: "And when all the land of Egypt was famished the people cried to Pharaoh for bread, and Pharaoh said unto all the Egyptians, Go unto Joseph: what he saith unto you, do ye." The agent-general of New Brunswick has received a letter from Mr. Chamberlain, acknowledging the receipt, with great pleasure, of the resolution passed by the St. John board of trade, endorsing Mr. Chamberlain. Mr. Chamberlain, in his reply, says that the support of the colonies is absolutely necessary for the success of his plans.

Electricity in Ottawa. In Chancery. Toronto, Nov. 16.—In the case of Randall vs. the Ottawa Electric Company, the court of appeal, to-day, rendered judgment allowing the appeal by Ahearn and Soper, and dismissing the plaintiff's action. Randall was injured by a live wire, when putting up the decorations for the visit of the Duke of York. As the result of the accident, the Ottawa Electric Light Company was and was shocked by a wire put up by Ahearn and Soper company, contractors for the civic decorations.

Canadian Sunshine.

Rev. Mark Guy Pearse, during the course of an eloquent address in Trinity Methodist church, on Friday afternoon said: "Canada is a wonderfully beautiful country. Never have I experienced such a climate. I speak with exaggeration, when I say that in six weeks of beautiful fall weather I have enjoyed here, I have seen more sunshine than in any two years in England. You speak of the 'Lady of the Snows,' why it's 'Lady of God's Sunshine,' you should say."

An Old Queen Dead.

New York, Nov. 16.—In her 101st year, Mary Pierson Harrison, who was in her childhood years, petted by George III, king of England, and was one of the old queens of the circus, is dead in Brooklyn.

Mrs. Kennedy To Be Tried Again. Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 16.—The case of Mrs. Lulu Prince Kennedy, charged with the murder of her husband, was called in court to-day and it is expected that the second trial of the famous case will begin shortly. Believing that he would not be able to be impartial in the trial, Judge John W. Wolford, who presided at the first hearing of the case, has sworn himself off the bench and named Judge Joshua W. Alexander, of Galatin, to try the case.

Mrs. Kennedy shot and killed her husband, Philip H. Kennedy, contracting agent of the Merchants' Dispatch company, in this city, January 10th, 1901. The shooting was the culmination of a sensational wedding, which Kennedy had brought suit to have set aside, asserting it had been forced. The couple had been married the preceding month, on which occasion the bride and brother accompanied the father, and Kennedy's actions indicated he was not a willing party to the contract. In his suit to have the marriage set aside Kennedy asserted that his life had been threatened if he refused to marry the woman. After the wedding he refused to live with his wife and the result was that Mrs. Kennedy visited him at his office and after a heated argument shot and killed him at his desk. The father and brothers of the girl were indicted as accomplices in the murder. At her first trial Mrs. Kennedy was sentenced to ten years in the penitentiary.
