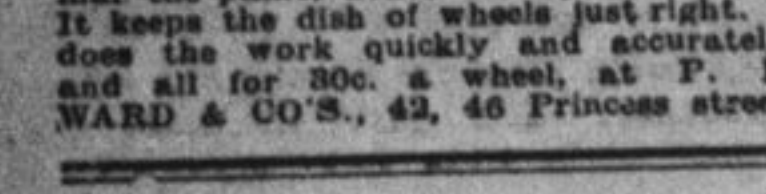

## BADLY INJURED. LORD KITCHENER HAD HIS LEG BROKEN

And In Two Places—A Restive Horse Crashed; The Injured Limb Against a Wall.



LORD KITCHENER, Simla, India, Nov. 17.—Lord Kitchener, commander-in-chief of British forces in India, has met with a serious accident while riding home alone from a country house near here. As he was passing through a tunnel his horse became frightened and collided with the walled side. One of Lord Kitchener's legs was broken in two places.

Some time afterwards, coolies passing through the tunnel found the commander-in-chief lying there helpless and brought him to Simla. He is now reported to be doing well. Although accustomed to the tunnel, Lord Kitchener's horse was frightened by suddenly coming upon a rattle. The animal swerved and jammed its rider against a beam in the side wall. His leg was twisted and both bones snapped above the ankle. Upon discovering the identity of the injured man, the coolies bolted and left him lying upon the ground where he suffered greatly for half an hour. The broken bones have been set, and, after having passed a good night, the general is in a cheerful mood. It appears that Lord Kitchener had formed the members of his staff that he was not going for a ride but, later, changed his plans. Hence, he was alone when the accident occurred.

## Montreal Live Stock Market.

Montreal, Nov. 16.—About 700 head of butchers' cattle, 75 calves and 800 sheep and lambs were offered for sale at the East End Abattoir, to-day. The butchers were out strong and trade was good with an upward tendency in prices all round. Prime beefs were scarce and sold at from 4 1/2c. to 4 3/4c. per lb.; pretty good cattle sold at from 2 1/2c. to 3 1/2c. and the common stock at from 2 1/4c. to 3 1/4c. per lb., while the canners paid from 1 1/2c. to 2c. per lb. Calves were scarce and higher in price, grassers sold at from 2 1/2c. to 3 1/2c. and good veals at from 4c. to 4 1/2c. per lb. Sheep sold at from 2 1/2c. to 3 1/4c., and lambs at from 4c. to 4 1/2c. per lb. Good lots of fat hogs sold at about 6 1/2c. per lb.

## TAKE ACTION.

The "Kishineff Question" Is Up Again.

Washington, D.C., Nov. 17.—Those interested in the "Kishineff question" do not believe that the agitation in the matter should cease with the filing of the monster petition in the archives of state, and if they can prevent it in interest in the matter shall not be allowed to flag for the want of intelligent stimulus to public opinion. The board of delegates on civil and religious rights of the union of American and Hebrew congregations, of which Simon Wolf of New York is chairman, is the body that has taken the leading part in the agitation against Russia for its responsibility in the Kishineff horror. To-day this board began a three days' meeting at the Arlington Hotel in this city for the purpose of reviewing what has been done and to decide upon further steps in the matter. It is expected that conferences will be held with the president and secretary of state and the congressional committee on foreign relations. The whole Kishineff affair will be reviewed and a programme of action for the future defined.

## As Associate Pastor.

At a meeting of the presbytery of Sydney, a call from the congregation of Sydney Mines, C.B., and signed by over 550 members representing over 220 families, to the Rev. H. L. McKinnon, M.A., B.D., as associate pastor to the Rev. Donald McMillan, was sustained. The call will be accepted. Provisional arrangements were made for Mr. McKinnon's induction on November 26th. The reverend gentleman is a native of Lake Umbagog, and was educated at Queen's University and Harvard, and a few days ago was honored with the degree of doctor of philosophy from Yale University.

## New Home For Historical Society.

New York, Nov. 17.—Next year is to be the centennial of the New York Historical Society and the society expects to celebrate the occasion by taking possession of its handsome new home to be erected at Seventy-sixth street and Central Park West. The cornerstone of the new building was laid to-day with interesting ceremony. Major Lord officiated and the address of the day was delivered by Hamilton W. Mabie. The new building will be put up in three sections. The central section will be finished, it is expected, within a year, at a cost of \$40,000.

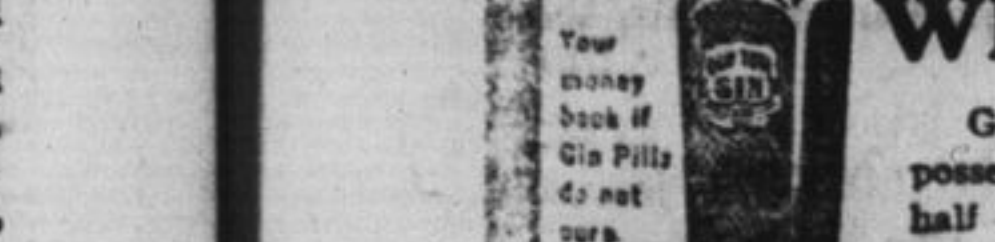
