

NEW ORGANIZED Real Estate Owners Form An Association for City Purposes.

Fairly Representative Meeting in the City Council Chamber--Capt. Gaskin's Array of Figures--Kingston's Heavy Debenture Debt.

In the opinion of the real estate owners of Kingston, it is expedient to form an association for mutual protection and the welfare of the city. This was decided at a meeting held last evening in the city council chamber, as arranged for by the real estate owners of Kingston, who met at a meeting held a week ago, at which it was decided to extend the movement towards organization so as to embrace the whole city. On motion of Capt. Gaskin, Dr. Brown was voted into the chair, with J. H. Donaldson, acting secretary. Dr. Brown spoke briefly, reviewing the work accomplished at the meeting in Hilda ward a week before. The object of the meeting, he said, was to form a real estate owners' association. The time was opportune for the formation of such an organization. The only point to consider was the advisability of forming the body suggested. It was not intended to place any of the gentlemen who form the city council on trial. The organization would be non-political, non-sectarian, and limited to actual real estate owners. Members of the city council, if real estate owners, could be members and might profit by it, but would assist that body in its good work. For instance, during the recent strike in the locomotive works such an organization might have used its good offices with beneficial results. The speaker advised the right of men to strike, if they so desired, but he thought they went beyond bounds when they went so far as to canvass others not to go to work, and thereby prevented them from becoming good citizens. If the strikers had succeeded in closing the locomotive works, the blow would have been felt by the property holders. Another thing to be considered was the city assessment. Kingston is over-assessed. No one man can exercise the knowledge necessary to assess the city with equality; errors are bound to creep in; one man could not keep in mind a correct estimate of land values. Three men going over the rolls could make a great many beneficial changes. The proposed association would not interfere with the aldermen but there were a thousand ways by which such an association would benefit the city. It would have a commanding influence among the citizens uniting them to stand together for the best interests of the city. He moved, seconded by R. J. Carson:

Resolved, That this meeting is strongly of opinion, that an association of the property owners of the city of Kingston should be formed without delay, as such an organization would be of the greatest value in promoting every interest of the city.

Ready to Organize. In seconding the resolution, R. J. Carson suggested that an adjournment be agreed to, after appointing a temporary executive committee, so as to obtain copies of the by-laws, rules, etc. of similar organizations elsewhere. Such an association in Kingston would be of the greatest benefit. There were many reforms that might be brought about. The city council was going too far in the matter of assessing the present rate too high. The association might suggest that the city council by a vote of the whole city, such a system would do away with the pernicious system of canvassing and would result in obtaining a better class of men in the council. The aldermen might select the mayor from among themselves, or the alderman obtaining the greatest number of votes might be declared mayor. It was time that the real estate owners were doing something to advance the interests of Kingston, which should have a population of 40,000 instead of only 20,000. Almost every industry which comes here seems to get a black eye. He had not money to invest in local

THE LATE MRS. MARSHALL. She Died In The Hospital During The Night.

Mrs. Marshall was interested always in philanthropic and charitable work, and was a lady of quiet, lovable qualities. LETTERS TO THE EDITOR. Accusation That Citizens Are Not Loyal. Kingston, Nov. 19.—(To The Editor): Is not the old conception of loyalty to the state sadly on the wane? Surely it is, and the proof can be found right at hand in our municipal affairs. Is something not wrong when people are anxious to go into the witness box and give evidence to the detriment of their city? I attended the non-jury sittings of the high court last Monday afternoon and those questions struck me with great force: Why are citizens so disloyal that they will abuse their city for the benefit of a stranger? And have lawyers no pride for their native place or loyalty to it, and are they willing to take an outsider's case for the fifty lre, giving all their energies to fighting against their city? If I was a lawyer, no aid would I ever give against my city; outsiders would be left that work. As a citizen, I am too loyal to raise my voice against Kingston in any sidewalk case. I was glad to see in your paper a reference to the duty of citizens in reporting loose or broken boards in sidewalks. I know of lots of cases where people will be grateful for defects and perhaps dangerous spots, but they will never report them to the proper civic authorities. Let every citizen arise to the sense of his responsibility, and he does not ingratiate himself by climbing the hill of progress—LOYALTY.

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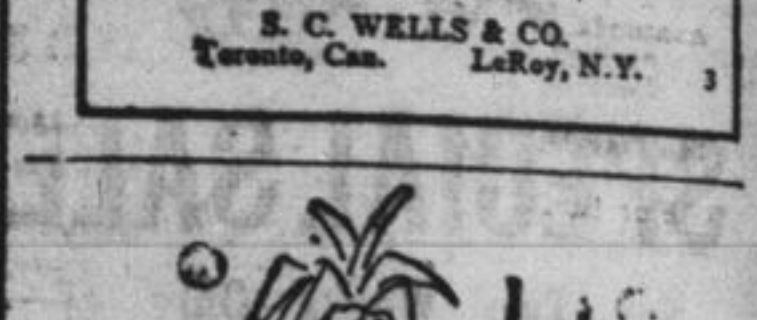

Dr. H. H. Hurdman a Victim of Pneumonia.

News has reached Ottawa of the death of Dr. H. H. Hurdman, son of the late Charles Hurdman, of Aylmer and a brother of the late Dr. Hurdman of Ottawa, who some time ago died in Brandon. The late Dr. Hurdman died in Johannesburg, South Africa, where he had been for the past year. Dr. Hurdman was for some time in Dawson City, where he was attached to the hospital of the North-West Mounted Police. It was while there that he contracted pneumonia, a second attack of which resulted in his death in Johannesburg. He was thirty-three years old and leaves three surviving brothers--Charles C. of Renfrew, W. H. of Ottawa, and J. A. of Ottawa. His sister, Mrs. W. A. Thompson, wife of Dr. Thompson, resides in Dawson, where she has been for some time. He was a nephew of Robert Hurdman, the well-known lumberman.
