

Held at The School of Mining on Thursday Evening. A meeting of the Eastern Ontario section of the Canadian Mining Institute was held Thursday evening in the chool of mines, the chairman being Dr. W. L. Goodwin, and secretary, John Donnelly, E.M. After routine ousiness had been transacted, the

hairman called on Prof. S. F. Kirkpatrick to read a paper on "Copper." The professor outlined the three me thods of treating copper ores, which are in use to-day in the three great copper producing countries. These me thods are practically determined the grade of the ore to be heated. The richer sulphide ores, that is, containing over six per cent of copper are treated by roasting, to expel part of the sulphur, then by reduction with coke to reduce the oxides of copper by formed by the roasting, to metalli copper matter. This process is repeated till the percentage of copper reach es over fifty, then the crude copper is refined by electrolysis. 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
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
