How They Worked The Game Montreal.

Montreal, Nov. 30.-Blackmail was the charge preferred against Joseph Valentine and Jean Paquette, in the police court, to-day, to which they pleaded "not guilty," and were remanded for trial. The story told the police as to methods alleged to have been adopted by the prisoners is a strange one. The prisoners rented a house on St. Timothee street, which had a certain reputation as a house of ill-repute, and so numerous were rings for admission during the night. after its suppression as a disreputable resort, that decent people would not rent it. The prisoners are said to have turned these visits to account by inviting callers in and demanding money for their release.
