Toronto, Dec. 7 .- A Globe special covered that the two small islands outlying Wales and Pearce, which the United States receives by the terms of the Alaskan boundary award, do not, after all, command Port Simpson harbor. The despatch continues: "Instead of lying respectively two and three miles distant, as stated in the memoranda before the boundary commission, these islands of Sitklan and Kannaghunt, according to surveyors, who have just returned from Fort Simpson and who are engaged in the railway exploration work, are twenty and thirty miles distant, and therefore, would not by any means command, as previously announced the new Pacific port. It is stated that the error of distance arose through a mistake in typing the commission memo 'twenty and thirty' miles distant being copied 'two or three' miles. 
