Washington, Dec. 10.—Baron Von Steinberg, the German ambassador, says that the emperor is profoundly touched by the many and sincere expressions of sympathy which have come from America to Berlin, regarding his majesty's illness. The ambassador returned to Washington, on Tuesday night, from a visit to Germany. He brings personal messages from his majesty to the president.

Obtained A Decree.

London, Dec. 10.—Countess Russell, whose marital troubles have several times been recounted in the English divorce court, to-day obtained a decree of divorce against her coachman husband, William Brown. Brown married the countess a year or so ago, while posing as Prince Athrobald Stuart De Modena. The countess obtained her decree on a charge of cruelty.

Widow Got Damages.

New York, Dec. 10.—The second trial of the action brought by Mrs. Henrietta Fremont against the Metropolitan Street railway company to recover \$89,000 damages for the loss of her husband, Francis M. Fremont, terminated in a verdict in Mrs. Fremont's favor for \$10,000. The first verdict gave Mrs. Fremont \$30,000.
