HE IS A MARVEL

LONDON SCHOOL BOARD DEFEATED.

"Fat Boy Of Peckham" Is Declared Exempt From School Attendance—Child in Years And Giant In Physical Development.

London, Dec. 11.—The London school board has been beaten by the fat boy of Peckham.

The fat boy of Peckham is a child of six, who lives with his parents, working people, at Colegrave road, midway between Rye Lane and the Old Kent road. He is about four feet in height, with a chest measurement of forty-four inches and a weight of ten stone. He has enormous strength for his age, and, altogether, is the pride of Peckham. He is of school age and the school board has been concerning itself about his education.

After elaborate inquiries and an examination by a doctor it has been decided that he is too big and too strong to go to school. A correspondent in a letter which appeared in yesterday's Times calls attention to this month's agenda of the special schools sub-committee, in which there appears the report of the doctor who examined the child.

In the course of his remarks he says: "This child is of abnormal development physically. The average given of his weight (ten stone) is quite true. The increase in weight is due not only to fat but to muscular development as well, since the child can easily lift an ordinary adult. Mentally he seems in some ways precocious; he is quite educable. Owing to his size and habits I do not think it is possible to place him in any school. It is obvious he cannot attend an ordinary infants' department; not only would his extraordinary appearance create disturbance, but his enormous strength would be dangerous to the other children."

"If taken to a physically defective centre he would take up the room of three or four children in the ambulances, even if he could be roused and dressed in time, which, from the history of the case, I should think improbable. I therefore suggest he be exempt from school attendance."

FASHION'S FORM.

A Rich Suit Of Mouse Grey Cloth.



This illustration shows a good design for a winter suit. It is made in mouse-grey broadcloth, a seven-gored skirt with circular founces, fitted on in points, and a jacket ending at the waist. Motifs are of a shade of duller velvet than the cloth. The cuffs turn back with a hand of velvet on the edge and a motif on the outside of each.

There are six motifs on the skirt, four around each side of the hips, and six down the front of the jacket, giving a vest effect. The collar, which is very deep in front, is also bound with the velvet. A large velvet hat with gray plumes should be worn with this suit, which is very smart when finished.

A SKIN SEWER

TO TAKE A BATH IS TO BE UNCLEAN.

It Also Is Fatal, Says a Doctor—To Wash In To Make a Sewer Of The Skin.

Chicago, Dec. 11.—When people leave off bathing there will be little or nothing for the doctors to do. Pneumonia, colds and a hundred other ills result from the foolish habit of washing the body; to bathe is to be dirty, for you thereby make a sewer of the skin. Blood, attracted by the skin, gives up products that should be left to seek a natural outlet, and soils the skin.

The foregoing declarations, made by Prof. John Dill Robertson, at the annual meeting of the Chicago Eclectic and Surgical Society, at the auditorium, has aroused the interest of members.

Prof. Robertson asserts that the authority that the clothing of the pores of the skin would result in death is false. He said that all physiologists which made such an assertion were wrong. The habit of taking "dry" baths was also denounced. The rubbing of each day a part over his head, according to Dr. Robertson, removed the natural scales of the skin, or the "false skin." This, he said, conducted to the growth of bacteria on the skin.

The doctor concluded with a touching incident of a poor Eskimo, brought from Greenland to Boston, who had never been ill in his life. He was given a bath, contracted pneumonia, and died in two days.

Clock Made Of Bread.

A clock made entirely of bread has been exhibited at Milan. The works are comparatively large, and for several years kept good time. The maker was a native of Milan, who devoted three years of his time to the task. He was very poor, and, being without means to purchase the necessary metal for making a clock, he set apart regularly each day a part of his bread, eating the crusts and saving the soft part. To solidify this he made use of a certain kind of salt, and when the various pieces became dry they were pressed hard and insoluble in water.

Another strange clock exhibited some years ago in London was constructed of pins, buttons and all sorts of odds and ends by a pauper named Mercer. The back and front of the clock was made of iron bed laths, while the barrel was part of a large brass ferrule, the ends being brass buttons hammered out. The barrel arbor had been originally the blade of a shoemaker's awl, the main and several other wheels were nothing more or less than suspensor buttons from his own trousers, while the cog teeth were portions of hygone knitting needles. The teeth of the centre wheels had once been rivets. In the dial there were one hundred separate pieces.
