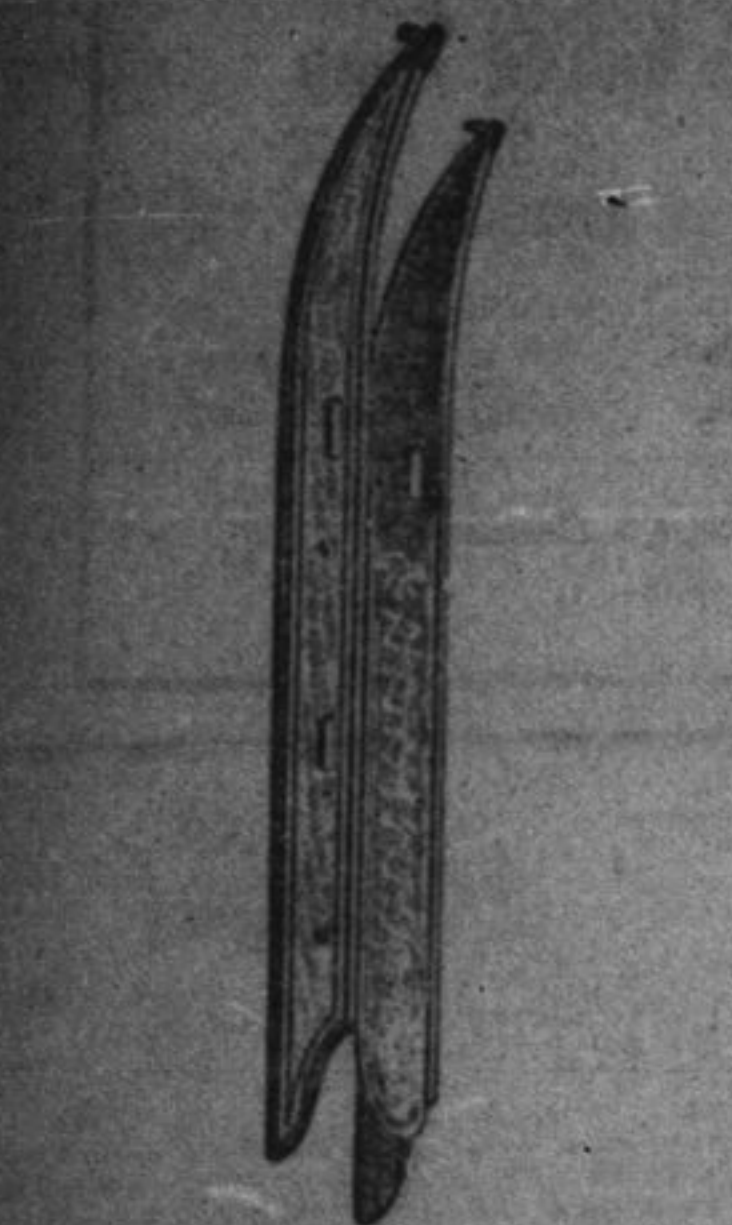

EVENTS IN NORTH RENFREW.

At a liberal meeting in North Renfrew, one which Hon. Mr. Ross addressed, James Findlay, a retired farmer and former Liberal, was allowed to ventilate his grievances. One was that no unnecessary delay occurred in the holding of an election. Another was that there was a great deal of political corruption in these latter days.

Mr. Ross was quite willing to account for the delay in calling for the election. Mr. Munro did before the election returns had been made and nothing could be done about the filling of his place until the legislature met. Two surviving members could certify to the vacancy and demand a new election, but they did not do this. That brought them to the 10th of March, and then they had the Gamey charges which had to be investigated before anything else was undertaken. The quality of this scandal had to be determined before an appeal to the people could be expected. When the report was made by the judicial commission public feeling ran high and it was deemed expedient to allow it to cool down. When the house rose in June the harvest was on, and when it was over many in the constituency had gone to the lumber districts, five or six hundred of them and these could not be disfranchised by the election being called in their absence. Hence the appointment which had been made of a nomination and polling during the holiday season.

In regard to the corruption of the times Mr. Ross had no apology to offer. He challenged any one to put his finger on political wrong-doing in his administration. The liberals in the thirty years they had directed provincial affairs had held over 900 elections, and no gross corruption was charged except in West Elgin and North Waterloo, and even in these ridings the government had not been incriminated. The opposition had had its weak moments and its weak candidates and had spent \$25,000 in the last provincial election, with the effect that four candidates had been unseated.

The explanation was sufficient, it is presumed, and even Mr. Findlay appears to have gone from the meeting satisfied. A LIVELY PUBLIC MEETING. A noisy meeting was that of the property owners, which took place in the council chamber on Monday evening. There was a good attendance and the promise of a lively consideration of leading public questions.

The first hour passed with a discussion of the new assessment bill, the leader in it being Mr. Pense, M.P.P. He gave a summary of the work of the special committee, and answered a great many important questions. Indeed the meeting seemed to get a tolerably clear and intelligent conception of a most perplexing subject. The proposed act is very long, and without the guidance of one who has attended the legislative meeting one would have some difficulty in understanding how far and how much it differed from the law which is now in force. That it is extremely radical in its tendencies became very apparent from what Mr. Pense said of it, and it will be decidedly revolutionary when it is put into operation even with all the modifications which are expected.

The meeting was not in the spirit to discuss the bill in detail. The chairman and some others were desirous of returning to routine business. Others insisted on proceeding, and for a few minutes the greatest disorder prevailed. The game was stormy enough for a time, and during the tumult men lost their heads, and indulged in grossly offensive language. It was an unfortunate break, and it spoiled the meeting. The calm judicial mind which the leaders desired to cultivate, the logic which carries conviction with it, was missing for a time, and some visitors to the room quietly but unhappily retired. The motion, laying the matter over to the next meeting, was eventually carried. There was a debate on the subject of purchasing the electric light plant. The idea influenced some men that the council should end the agreement in regard to lighting the city, and that by such a cancellation the litigation between the city and company would speedily terminate. Representatives of the company, however, intimated that the agreement in regard to street lighting could not be cancelled, and that there would not be a compromise so far as they were concerned. They were quite willing that the franchise and the plant should go to the city, but they were bound to make out of the sale all they could. The discussion on this subject was carried

SENIOR HOCKEY SCHEDULE FOR THIS DISTRICT.

Queen's Have Eight Hours' Practice a Week At The Rink—Limestone Will Likely Play Senior Rugby Next Year—Notes On Sports.

Kingston lovers of hockey will have no cause for complaint this season for want of attractions. The new schedule for No. 2 District, O.H.A., senior series, which was drawn up at Brockville yesterday afternoon, provides lots of contests and insures the coming to Kingston of such well-known organizations as Ottawa Aberdeens, Crosses of Perth, Smith's Falls, and the newly formed senior team at Brockville. This district is really a separate and distinct league by itself, the appointing of referees being left to Convenor Jones, of Brockville, and while owing allegiance to the O.H.A. executive, that body will be let alone as much as possible.

General Sport.

Port Perry's ice racing dates have been changed to January 6th and 7th.

THE EFFECT IN KINGSTON

Of The Increased Price In The Cartage Of Freight.

The effect of the increase of cartage rates by the Canadian Freight Association has been very marked in Kingston. Strong opposition has been made to the big increases, and the result is that the Shelden company and the K. & P. railway's waggons will not do much business hereafter. Nearly all the Kingston wholesale houses and manufacturing places have put on special carters of their own to do their hauling, rather than pay the rates now charged. Where the railway freight waggons hitherto carried small boxes to the merchants, the latter will transfer this work to their delivery men and boys.

The increased rates, it is held, are perhaps fair enough in cities like Montreal, Quebec, Ottawa, Toronto, etc., where long distances have to be travelled, but in Kingston and places of like size it is hardly fair to charge the same. Merchants hold that the rates should be graded. On the other hand, the freight carriers say there is very little money in the business. Boards of trade in some places are making vigorous protest against the increased rates.
