An Evening Frock Of Very Pretty Design.



This is a very pretty design for an evening frock, and can be made in any pale color or white. Crepe de chine, mousseline de soie, liberty gauze, or even a fabric like Paris muslin or organdy would look well in a frock made from this design.

The only trimming required is lace diamonds, but of these it takes six yards of fabric. The width of the skirt is one yard in diamond shape that can be cut apart, and this is less expensive than buying the separate motifs.

The entire frock is box-placed, and around the neck, waist, and lower part of the skirt bands of the same material are put in diamond shape around the lace. The idea of the points coming up on the neck gives a very pretty effect.
