Liberal Council Will Seek to Serve the People During the Year 1904.

Mayor Bell Was Re-Elected But Will Have to Take His Orders From Liberals and Thus Be Humbled--The Vote in the Three Wards Where Contests Occurred.

Oh, what a fall was there, my countrymen! Mayor Bell realized the bitter truth of this adage last evening when the results began to pour in from the different sub-divisions, and he found that he was the recipient of what is generally termed, in the language of the street, an "Irishman's hoist." From a majority of 228 last year he was obliged to satisfy himself with a scant 181 this year, in face of the fact that he had the prestige of the fullest organized efforts of the conservative party behind him, against the non-organized campaign of his opponent. Mayor Bell had on an average five tried and true campaigners of the conservative party at each polling sub-division, while Graham in many instances did not have a single worker, and at the outside he did not have more than one or two at those polls that were manned in his behalf. Taking all these things into consideration, Mayor Bell must feel humiliated at the poor showing he made at the polls. While it must be admitted that he was elected the result of the vote shows that the ratepayers were dissatisfied with his rule as mayor; had the outcome been left to the free will of the electors, without the exertion of the influence of the conservative party, the mayor would undoubtedly have been snowed under, he can give thanks to two elements for his return—the perfectly organized conservative party at his back, and the non-organized single-headed efforts of his opponent. These are indisputable facts, as every ratepayer who visited the polls has reason to know. In a sense Mayor Bell's victory may be considered a defeat, because had his rule last year been popular, and had all the reform voters exercised their franchise and had given Graham a helping hand, Mayor Bell would have been invited to have remained at home in no measured terms. However, certain elements entered into the contest that aided the mayor's campaign; he does not owe his return to the popularity, nor to the desire of the ratepayers that he should have a second term. Humiliation is ascribed as being beyond the limit of human endurance; Mayor Bell should bear this fact in mind in connection with his campaign statement, in consideration of the fact that the political complexion of the council this year is reform. However, it might be considered inexpedient to put the city to the test of another mayoralty contest in view of existing low financial conditions.

How The Wards Went. In three wards only were there contests, which had some effect upon the total vote polled, many of the electors not being able to go to the polls. The strongest fight was put forth in Frontenac ward, where a battle royal was fought, worthy of a parliamentary election. The outcome was the return of the reformers and one conservative, Alderman Tait, falling by the wayside to give place to a new and younger champion in the person of Alderman McLeod. In the other two wards the contest was not so keen, but a fairly spirited fight was put up. Here also, as in Frontenac ward, two reformers and one conservative were returned, Alderman-elect T. J. Rigney filling the shoes so long, faithfully and satisfactorily worn by ex-Alderman Walker, who, of his own free will, retired from the council this year. In Cataragui ward the reformers had only one champion, in the person of William Strains, and they had the satisfaction of seeing him elected by a substantial majority. Alderman-elect Daniel Couper, who withstood the "lancing cold" in order to assist me.

Almost without effort the reformers secured a majority in the council; the conservatives having ten, counting the mayor, and the reformers twelve. Three years have passed since the reformers have had an innings at the council board, though records show that to the reform element of last two councils has been due almost all the progressiveness put into effect, though the conservatives ruled with a majority. With the material with which this year's council is composed, that body ought to thrive, and the ratepayers ought to reap the benefit of keen judgment and advanced ideas. An analysis of the vote polled this year, with that of last year, might prove interesting. Last year the total vote polled was 2,609, of which 1,111 received 1,223, Graham 995 and White 91, giving Bell a plurality of 228. This year the total vote cast was 2,213, of which Bell received 1,197, and Graham, 1,016, leaving Bell a majority of 181. It will be seen that the total vote of this year fell behind that of last year by 396, and that Bell suffered a loss on his total poll this year of 37. Bell carried a majority in every ward, though Graham ran well in some sub-divisions, particularly in sixteen, seventeen and eighteen, Rideau, and twenty Victoria wards. SPORT REVIEW. EXHIBITION MATCH WON BY BELLEVILLE. Against a Kingston Team By 5 to 2--Ottawa Defeated Winnipeg in Final Stanley Cup Contest. A Kingston hockey team consisting of three of the junior Bechgroves, two seniors and two intermediates, played an exhibition match in Belleville against the strong seven of that town, which was assisted by Wallace, of McGill. The score resulted 5 to 2 in favor of Belleville. At half time the count was 5 to 1. Belleville played an exceedingly rough and illegal game, but everything was in an exhibition contest, even McGuire's charging into the Kingston goal-keeper and scoring. "Reddy" McMillan was again on the Belleville team, Brown tried rough tactics on Vanflora, but received the worst of the argument, and the Kingston man was ruled off. "Dick" Mills was struck on the head by the pack and had to retire, his place being taken by "Billy" Mitt.

Ottawa Are Champions. The final Stanley cup hockey contest at the capital last night was hotly contested. Ottawa defeated the Winnipeg team by 2 to 0 and thus retained possession of the trophy which carries with it the world's championship. Brockville wants an exhibition match with Ottawa. Ottawa players display marked superiority over Winnipeg players when close in on the nets. Stuart Hayside has been elected first vice-president of the Strathcona Hockey club, of Lancaster. A meeting of the O.H.A. senior group No. 2, has been called to rearrange the schedule, owing to the postponement of the match between the Michigan Soo and a member of the 'Varsity team appeared under a false name, an offence against the ordinary amateur rule.

The Cornwall Hockey club will make its first appearance in the new F.A.H.L. series in Montreal on Wednesday next, in a championship match with the Montreal club, to be played in the Stadium rink. The O.H.A. has ordered Sully and Thessalon to refuse to play 'Varsity' on account of the latter team playing at the Michigan 'Soo.' These towns had exhibition matches arranged with the Toronto tourists. A young Kingstonian who has returned from Pittsburgh, Pa., stated to-day that all the Kingstonians playing hockey in the Smoky City had been "fired" by the rink management for rough play, save "Dick" Wilson, who was continued on the pay sheet of the A.C. team. A permit has been granted to "Billy" McLaren by the O.H.A. to play with his home team, the Creston Ice Club. McLaren has been playing in Toronto since last April. If Kingston had been able to get a few such permits, she might put forth a strong senior team, with McKay, Murphy and Hiscock in Toronto; O'Leary and Morgans in Ottawa, etc.

General Sport. Vancouver lacrosse club will challenge for the Minto cup. 'Over the Hog Line,' says the Topical Review, is the only one of the municipal limits of Toronto, rather than to the curling game.
