MURDERERS GARROTED, BUT AFTERWARDS REVIVED.

Americans Are Not Yet Experts in The Use of Spanish Means of Execution.

The Manila Times contains an account of an execution by garroting, which seems to show that in unskillful hands the garrote is an ineffective instrument. According to the newspaper account, Nicholas Anselmi, Daniel Varson, Antonio Javir, and Furstino Pascual, murderers, were garroted at Amuling, Cagayan province, October 31st. All are merry as merry can be, highland girls being quick of wit. The cloth is tightly rolled up, and then follows an impressive consecration ceremony. The cloth is turned sunrise three times by the three most important women present, who each repeat a "vann" while turning it. Then the chief, with her hand resting on the cloth, pronounces a "spell" on the cloth and on those who are to wear it, a sort of blessing. "CURSE" OF OATMEAL.

Scots Doctor Denounces Scotland's Staple Food.

It is starting to hear of oatmeal, Scotland's staple food, being denounced as an article of diet by a Scottish doctor, well known as a diet specialist. "As an article of diet," he remarked, "oatmeal is very much over-rated. I consider it the curse of Scotland and the curse of every community which acquires a liking for it. This is a sensational charge to bring against a food which has for so long formed the staple diet of millions, but I am prepared to back up my statement by facts."

There are two classes of persons who partake of oatmeal—those doing hard, manual, and bodily labor, and those who work with their brains, but do not do much with their muscles. The first division, such as Scottish quarries, find oatmeal a good enough article of diet. But owing to the excessive muscular efforts by which they maintain themselves, they could eat paying stonemasons.

To the second class, however, the people who live in towns and who work with their brains, and are troubled with digestive disturbances, oatmeal is little short of a poison. The average town diet of meat potatoes and bread will supply the constance with infinitely more proteid and also phosphates than he would obtain from oatmeal with less digestive effort.

Dr. Johnson said that oatmeal was a food only fitted for Scotsmen and donkeys. I entirely agree with him. The Englishman who attempted to digest it are the donkeys mentioned by Dr. Johnson. The immediate effect of eating oatmeal is a feeling of such extreme satisfaction that the person eating it is unable to partake of any more food. For an hour and a half or two hours, the feeling of satisfaction continues, but then soon begins a feeling of discomfort in "Little Mary" and a desire to swallow saliva. There are other disgusting symptoms and then the stomach feels empty and manifests a semi-catastrophic condition by a feeling of false hunger. The un-informed layman is almost delighted to find that this hunger disappears at the sight of food. He does not know that his stomach is getting into a condition of chronic catarrh.

Another disease caused by oatmeal, too, is appendicitis or avelonitis, or oat-toes, are often found after operation. The eating of oatmeal is also responsible for much drunkenness among the working classes, especially in Scotland. chine the bodies were laid upon the floor of the church in Amuling and the relatives might claim them and take them away. Dr. Licena, the provincial surgeon, certified to their death, and the judge gave the seal of judicial approval.

Some three hours later, according to the newspaper account, two constabulary officers, Capt. Long and Lieut. Collins, entered the church to see if the bodies had been claimed. They were horrified to find that three of the criminals were still alive and asking for water. Water and restoratives were applied freely, the men were unbound, and were soon able to be removed, by their friends. The fourth had already been removed and was really dead.

One of the other three has since died from the shock and exhaustion. The remaining two, at latest reports, were convalescing, and may live for years to come. But it is written on the court records of their execution that the law are ended. They cannot sue, be sued, marry, own property, vote, or exercise any of the rights of a citizen. Neither will they be held accountable for their acts. If arraigned for depositions it will only be necessary to rest on the court record of their death.
