IS DOING GOOD WORK.

A Young Kingstonsian In Charge Of Le Roy Mine.

The Roseland, D.C. Mine, of the issue of January 1st, contains an interesting account of the installation of an Elmore oil concentration process plant at Le Roy No. 2, gold mine. It is the first Elmore plant to be erected in Canada, and much interest attaches thereto. Small tests made so far show the plant to be a success. It is in charge of George H. Dickson, a Kingstonsian, a graduate of the Kingston school of mining, who is mentioned as being the superintendent, and who supervised its construction and installation. Under his watchful care the plant is giving satisfaction.

The Le Roy No. 2 plant hitherto handled fifty tons of crude ore, but with the enlarged crushing and concentration plant, double that amount can be handled without increased cost. For this reason, it is suggested that probably the plant will be increased to a 200-ton capacity, with proportionately reduced cost of handling.
