Contract For Paper.

Toronto, Jan. 19.—The Ontario government has passed an order-in-council awarding the contract for paper for the next five years to the Rioridan firm, of Merritt, B.C. The price is said to be much below what the government has paid previously. The contract, it is understood, is worth in the neighborhood of \$10,000 to \$12,000 per year. The competition this year was decidedly keen.

Rancher Dropped Dead.

St. Thomas, Ont., Jan. 19.—William R. Stewart, an extensive rancher of Alberta fell dead in the city, yesterday afternoon. Mr. Stewart, accompanied by his wife, and six-year-old boy, was on the way from visiting relatives at Ridgeway to visit friends at Galt and Guelph. Heart failure was the cause of death.

Electrocuted By a Saucepan.

Paris, Jan. 19.—M. Fay, the engineer of the High Tension Electric Power company, of Thiers, was killed yesterday by coming in contact with a live electric wire. The engineer was investigating a deviation of current, when he touched the saucepan with his foot. He stumbled forward, and uttering several unintelligible words, fell to the ground. He was dead when he was found. He was forty years of age, and had been married for twenty years. He was a native of Thiers, and had been in Paris for several years.

Sold Carpet Tacks For Pills.

Belleville, Ont., Jan. 19.—A patent medicine pedlar, who was around here some time ago, is discovered to have worked a fraud. He went from house to house offering for sale alleged to be iron pills for sale. He made a few sales, and one of the boxes when opened, was discovered to contain six carpet tacks and a piece of chalk. How many have been victimized it is hard to say.

EVENTS OF DAY

GIVEN IN THE BRIEFEST POSSIBLE FORM.

AN HOTEL PROPRIETOR

Shoots Topsy Man At Jaffray, B.C.
Fernie, B.C., Jan. 19.—At Jaffray, a small lumber town, thirty-two miles west of here, on Saturday night, John McGee, a young lumber jack, was instantly killed by being hoisted through the body with two shots from a sixteen calibre shot gun at close range, in the hands of Louis Gillier, proprietor of the Jaffray Hotel. McGee and two companions had been around the hotel all evening, and had taken considerable at the bar. Just before retiring McGee acted in a familiar manner towards Mrs. Gillier, whereupon Gillier fired two shots at him, McGee died immediately. Gillier was arrested and brought to Fernie last night. McGee comes from Nova Scotia.

NAPOLÉON'S WELCOME.

Bonaparte's Grandson Gets Ovation From Parisians.
Paris, Jan. 19.—Prince Louis Napoleon, who is a general in the Russian army, has been accorded a leave of absence by the czar sufficiently long to enable him to regulate the affairs of the late Princess Mathilde. He was greeted on his arrival in Paris with cheers and cries of "Vive le Général Bonaparte!" and welcomed by the leading members of the Bonapartist party. He drove at once to rejoin his mother, Princess Clothilde, who lives habitually in Paris. Prince Louis Napoleon is residuary legatee of Princess Mathilde.

A HOT FIGHT.

Union And Non-Union Men Use Revolvers.
Kansas City, Mo., Jan. 19.—Fifty non-union bridge workers employed on the Union Pacific railroad company's new bridge across the Kansas river, and about a hundred members of the Structural Iron Workers' union, engaged in a pitched battle at the new Union Pacific bridge in Kansas City, today. Thirty revolver shots were fired, and hundreds of bricks were thrown, and several men injured, two severely. E. B. Powers was shot through the thigh, and T. P. Ayers received a deep scalp wound, and was otherwise bruised.

MORLEY HEARD FROM.

Calls Balfour Government Scratch Cabinet.
London, Jan. 19.—John Morley was presented with the freedom of Arbroath, in recognition of his public services and his dedicating to the community his "Life of Gladstone." In a speech he called the Balfour government a scratch cabinet. The crew was aloft on a raft. The slower increase of trade, he said, was due to the larger volume of the great free part of the world. That was the imperialism he swore by. Retaliation was not possible.

TRYING TO TRACE IT.

Sensational Arrest Is Looked For At Any Time.
Winnipeg, Jan. 19.—Important developments are expected in Calgary during the next day or two in connection with the package containing \$10,000, in Bank of Hamilton bills, lost six weeks ago in transit between Winnipeg and the coast.

MIRACULOUS ESCAPE.

Of Passengers On a Pennsylvania Train.
Corry, Pa., Jan. 19.—A wreck occurred at Prospect, on the Chautauque division of the Pennsylvania road, this morning, and the passengers miraculously escaped death. The train was derailed by broken rails. It was the Pittsburgh night express, which left Buffalo last night. All trains are running via Erie, and the Lake Shore as the tracks are blocked.

LIVED TO BE 112.

Was 108 Before She Saw a Railroad Train.
Indiana, Pa., Jan. 19.—Mrs. Leah Keith, Indiana county's oldest resident, died at her home near Gracemore at the age of 112. Although she had lived in this county for eighty years she was never in the county seat and never saw a railroad train until about four years ago, when the Pennsylvania railroad projected a branch into the territory adjacent to her home.
