SPORT REVIEW. BECHGROVES WALLOPED THE CADETS.

THE INAUGURAL MEETING OF THE LOCAL BOARD OF HEALTH.

John McIntyre Re-Elected Chairman—Attempting to Trace Source of Typhoid Fever—To Look Into Cases of Improper Plumbing.

The inaugural meeting of the local board of health was held at the mayor's office Monday afternoon, those attending being John McIntyre, Alderman Meek, W. Simmonds, J. D. Thompson, Medical Health Officer Fee, and Sanitary Inspector Gordon.

On motion, of Alderman Meek and W. J. Simmonds, John McIntyre was unanimously elected chairman. Upon taking his seat, the newly elected chairman asked the members to please consider his speech of thanks to the medical profession.

Three accounts for small amounts were presented and passed. The medical health officer reported that during December there were typhoid cases reported, the epidemic number being four of typhoid fever.

It was pointed out that two deaths—students of Queen's—had occurred during the month, which led Mr. Thompson to ask concerning the sanitarian of the university buildings.

In reply Chairman McIntyre entered into a lengthy explanation of the result of his investigation in an attempt to trace the origin of the last case reported. The attending physician was unable to give it. The chairman interviewed Principal Gordon, who said the medical professors had met and discussed the question and reported that the university buildings were perfectly satisfactory.

Alderman Meek pointed out that both samples of milk came from the county and he asked what action the board could take. Mr. Thompson replied that the board could prevent it being brought into the city and sold.

It was decided to send strongly worded letters to both vendors, pointing out the fact that they were doing a living shoddy business of lack of cleanliness. Further examinations will be made, and if the milk does not make a better showing, the vendors will lose their licenses.

Mr. N. Veale, secretary of the local union of plumbers, wrote the board complaining of the existence of unskilled plumbing in two hotels and a King street factory.

Regarding the last named, Mr. Simmonds said the defect was being rectified. The sanitary inspector and medical health officer had both visited the factory and reported that the plumbing work was in charge of the two vendors.

The board decided to meet at the call of the president, when there is a business for the members to consider. Mr. McIntyre said he would be in the office of securing a suitable place to be used as a contagious disease hospital, pointing out the need of such a place.

The chairman promised to do all he could towards the securing of such a building. The line outside of which ice for domestic purposes may be cut was adopted, having been laid out by the sanitary inspector and medical health officer.

Death of Mrs. John Jewell. The death occurred at Harriston, Ont., on Monday, of Christina Brash, wife of John Jewell, both formerly of Kingston. Mrs. Jewell was ill for a week of pneumonia. She was the daughter of the late Robert Brash, of Portmouth, and a sister of Mrs. Thomas Hewitt, Mrs. Hopkins, Kingston; Robert Brash, Pittsburg; Mrs. Reid, Barre, Vt.; and Mrs. Moody, Toronto. Her husband was formerly of the brewery firm of Downing, Wales & Jewell, of this city. Mr. and Mrs. Jewell intended to remove to Kingston next May to reside.

Queen's Philosophical Society. Prof. John Marshall gave an interesting paper on "Matthew Arnold," before Queen's Philosophical Society last evening. The attendance of students was large. The discussion was participated in by Prof. Dyde, the society's critic, and Messrs. N. F. Plack, and J. M. Duff, M.A.
