Everything was tinted ivory and a soft shade of green. This tint ing appeared uniform throughout the building. The immense wards were circular, heated with hot water pipes. and with fireplaces in the centre. standing, as it were, back to back, built into the great central shaft which prevented patients from seeing each other across the room, and gave more privacy to each individual than is usual in a public ward. The minister of the interior has just received 'a petition from the carmers' Institute of the district of East Algoma, which deals with "the representations made to him as min ster of the interior by representatives of various labor organizations on January 4th, 1904, in the city of Toronto, to the effect that more chanics and farm laborers are wanted in this country. The petition proceeds: "We,

members of the East Algoma Farmers' Institute, wish to emphatically protest against this most unwarranted statement, knowing as we do that exactly the reverse is the case. Hundreds of unfinished buildings and thousands of buildings projected have not been started that would have been built under favorable conditions of the labor market, which testifies to the undoubted fact that there has been throughout the province of Ontario during the past season an extraordinary scarcity of mechanics.
