THE WAR FUNDS SUBSTANTIALLY INCREASED BY SUBSCRIPTION.

It embodies proposals representing the utmost that Russia can offer, but is hardly calculated to satisfy the demands contained in Japan's last note.

Despatches From Near And Distant Places.

EVENTS OF DAY GIVEN IN THE BRIEFEST POSSIBLE FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody Notes From all Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

Several women burglars have been arrested at New York for hiding babies and cruelly pinching them to make them excite sympathy by their wails.

Alphonse Calkins is under arrest at Bolton, N.Y., charged with criminally assaulting the five-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. Willet.

To avoid a church wedding, which they desired, Mr. W. Creighton and Mollis Clark, Baltimore, eloped and were married unconventionally.

John Sandram, steerage passenger on the steamer Cedric, committed suicide by jumping overboard from New York to Queenstown.

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On the charge that he compelled his daughter, fifteen years old, to steal from her employer, Edward Adams, Newark, N.J., has been held for the grand jury.

The will of the late Hugh Stowell Scott, better known as Henry Seton Merriman, the novelist, shows that he left an estate of \$250,000.

From the fact that the severe winter has made ice available near the main line, the New York Central railroad company has cancelled its contract at Cape Vincent for 1,200 car loads of St. Lawrence river ice.

The Canadian Pacific railway officials have announced that a British judge in Hong Kong has to say to the Chinese government \$98,000 for running down a Chinese gunboat with one of its steamships, the Empress of Japan.

Among the conservatives present at the High Cecil, which was the late Marquis of Salisbury, C. T. Ritchie, formerly chancellor of the exchequer, and Winston Churchill. The dinner was given for the leaders and the ladies and their families, which was followed by the reception at which there were 1,500 guests.

COLLECTOR OVERRULED.

Too High a Duty Charged On Wood Pulp From Canada. Ottawa, Feb. 6.—The department of customs has received a copy of a ruling by the United States general appraisers in the matter of protests by a Chicago company, against the assessment of duty by the collector of customs at Chicago, on an importation of unbleached wood pulp, in rolls, from the province of Quebec.

The appraising board over-ruled the decision of the Chicago collector. They confirmed, however, the imposition of a countervailing duty of twenty-five cents additional per cord, by reason of the fact that the province of Quebec levies export duty on pulpwood at the same rate.

REV. ELWOOD FOUND GUILTY.

Minister Who Preached Lynching Let Off With Caution. Wilmington, Del., Feb. 6.—Rev. Robert A. Elwood, pastor of Olivet Presbyterian church, was tried by the Newcastle Presbytery on charges growing out of the sermon entitled, "Should the murderer of Helen Bishop be lynched?"

A committee of five was appointed to fix punishment and after some deliberation the committee recommended that Elwood be cautioned to be more careful in the future. The presbytery accepted the recommendation.

LEAP YEAR RIGHTS.

Girls Clamor For Them In Minnesota. Minneapolis, Minn., Feb. 6.—The girls of Minnesota find that their leap year privileges are not what they should be and have called on Governor Van Sant through a letter written by one of their members appointed as a committee of one asking that the governor proclaim their leap-year rights so that the young men of the state may be brought to a realization of their duties during leap year.

A MAJORITY OF EIGHTY-SIX.

The Balfour Ministry Still Retains The Confidence of Parliament. London, Feb. 6.—In the ultimate division in the house of commons on Mr. Robson's amendment to the address, the government had a majority of eighty-six, the vote being 192 for and 106 against the amendment, a total of 478. There are 670 members in the house. The normal majority of the ministry is 120.

The Mystery Solved.

MacLeod, N.W.T., Feb. 6.—The mystery surrounding the disappearance of J. McHenry, of Vernon, B.C., who was last seen on December 10th, was cleared up yesterday, when the body of the missing man was found frozen on the pasture ground of the mountain police. There were no signs of foul play. McHenry was well known as a buyer of grain.

To Spend Vacation Here.

Berlin, Ont., Feb. 6.—Fred Hull and Joseph Bellinger, each aged about fifteen, the former from Galt, were this morning sentenced by Police Magistrate Weir, to five years each in the Kingston penitentiary, for burglary of Simon Yost's store, in this town, some time ago. These boys had served time in the Reformatory and Bellinger was merely at large, subject to good behaviour.

The Commons-Speakership.

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—It is not likely that the speaker of the House of Commons will be designated until the last minute, though it remains probable that Mr. Belcourt, Ottawa, will get the post. In the meantime, the executive duties of the speakership are performed by Mr. Brodeur.
