SKETCH GIVEN OF A VISIT PAID TO E. W. RATHBUN.

By a Scotchman Who Accompanied Principal Grant—Mr. Rathbun Allowed No Waste in Anything.

Montreal Witness. A Canadian paper which has come to me with a portrait of the late E. W. Rathbun, of Deseronto, recalls vividly to my mind a delightful week I spent with him and his family and friends in 1886. I had been at Kingston visiting my old and noble friend and fellow student, Principal Grant, of Queen's University, when, one day, the principal said: "I want you to come with me to-morrow to Deseronto and make the acquaintance of Mr. Rathbun there. He is a man as good as he is great—in every way a man worth knowing."

Next day we took the steamer, and, after a six or seven hours' sail, reached Deseronto. It was right when we arrived, but Mr. Rathbun was at the pier to welcome us, and conduct us to his delightful and hospitable home. I was struck from the first with Mr. Rathbun's appearance—his fine, commanding presence and the look in his face, especially in his eye, of alertness and power, softened by a beautiful expression of geniality and kindness.

On the morning after our arrival, when I had my first inspection of Deseronto, and remarked to Principal Grant on the beauty of the grounds around Mr. Rathbun's house and the bright and lively appearance of the young town that was springing up in its neighborhood, Dr. Grant said: "When I see it I think sometimes of that couplet about the old roads in the Scottish Highlands: 'If you'd seen the roads before they were made, You'd lift up your hands and bless General Wade.'"

People who saw this place twenty or twenty-five years ago, when it was miserable, marshy waste, and who look at it now, may well bless Mr. Rathbun. It shows what one man can do, when he has brains, character, energy and enterprise. The more I saw of Mr. Rathbun and of the work he was doing, and achieving, the more I was impressed with the range of his power and the nobility of his character. One thing remains with me as thoroughly characteristic. He was showing me round the works one day, and we had just left the great saw mill, where I had been watching the procession of logs hurrying up the slide and being cut and shaped by the circular saws as they passed. I asked him what came of the quantity of waste that fell away from the sides of the lumber as it was passing up and being shaped by the saws. "Waste!" he replied, with a smile, "nothing is waste here. Everything is used up for one purpose or another—for boards, paving blocks, railway ties, lathing, fence posts, shingles, and so on. The chips also are assorted and tied up into bundles of kindling wood for the market. Even the sawdust—which you will see thrown by thousands of tons into the river when you go to Ottawa—we use here as fuel to run our machinery; and at our chemical works over there we extract from it gas, acetate of lime, acetic acid, alcohol for manufacturing purposes, crocoite oil and tar for roofing and road work, some for use here, the rest for the market. There is no waste. Something is made out of everything."

The remark impressed itself all the more upon my mind from finding afterwards when we got into talk about religious matters, that there was a good deal in his views of human nature and destiny akin to his views about the good use of that could be about the good use of the works that others might regard as rubbish. He believed there was good in everybody, that everyone might be turned to some good account if he were treated in the right way. He seemed to me a human being, however coarse, reckless, cruel or vicious he might be. He thought there was something good to appeal to even in the worst, if we could only find it. That, Christ, he said, treated men on that assumption, and so won to Him people whom others thought beyond redemption, or not worth saving. Mr. Rathbun's hope seemed to be the same as Tenney's: "That nothing walks with sinless feet. That not one life would be destroyed. Or cast as rubbish to the void, When God has made the pile complete."

SOLDIER ENDS LIFE. Because of An Order—Comrades Claim He Was Ill. New York, Feb. 6.—With the burial in Cypress Hills cemetery of Private Frank Smith, of the Ninety-eighth Infantry, United States artillery, there was revealed the story of his death in the Fort Hamilton military reservation. Smith's comrades say that he put an end to his life because he was ordered to do duty by Surgeon Major Junius L. Powell when he was sick and unfit to work. Smith's death, it is alleged, has brought to light causes of ill treatment of sick soldiers at the reservation and an investigation is being conducted by a board of inquiry. Scores of soldiers have been brought before the board to tell what they know of Smith's death. No information concerning the death of Smith has been given to the police or coroner, it is said. It is admitted by officers at the fort that Smith asked Maj. Powell to be relieved from guard duty because of illness, and that the latter refused the request. Smith left Maj. Powell's quarters and going to the gunhouse secured a rifle and loaded it. A few minutes later the gun was discharged and Smith fell to the floor with his face completely blown off.
