ALL-ENGAGING  
IS THE WEATHER TOPIC IN AMERICA'S METROPOLIS.

Sympathize With Mrs. Maybrick—Reflections on the Situation in the East—Two Powerful Organizations Coming.

Special Correspondence, Letter No. 1,394. New York, Feb. 5.—The subject which seems to engross all is the weather, which has been a standing horror for all the week. It is extremely fortunate for the author, who claims the ownership of "The Beautiful Snow." I could not help admiring the lightness and grace of a good honest fellow citizen, who exclaims: "If I had that cuss here I would punch his head until he was a subject for a coroner's inquest." The qualifying verbs and adverbs in the English language are numerous and forceful, but there was not enough of them to give power to the anathema. It was awful, dreadful, shocking, but the good plain Anglo-Saxon word, uncomfortable, best and yet but faintly describes our feelings. Even the skidding maniac would concede that nothing gives you as good an idea of the greatness of the storm as the fact that it took 1,200 men to clear away the snow. Our sidewalks were hardly cleared than it was succeeded by another storm, not crawling upon us like a thief in the night, but more terrible and more sudden. I had the impression that we must give up attempting to describe the storm; it only serves to unloose all the bad temper within me; we will hope that we may never see it, like again; yet here, not satisfied with the home product, we must be spending good money to hunt up the north pole. Just think of it, at the Adirondack thirty degrees below zero, isn't that just what we need? With the new means of rapid transit at our command, with Florida, the West Indies, Bermuda and other happy spots upon the earth where one can feel a genial sun on his face, and enjoy the fruits of banana, the orange and the coconut grow, talk no more to me of the northern role; the walrus, seal, white whale and other amphibious animals may thrive, grow and enjoy themselves, if they will, but a few miles either side of the equator for me; I have no use for greasy-lubber and polar bears.

Our people and the wide world were not sorry to learn, the other day, that Mrs. Maybrick, who was accused of poisoning her husband, is once more a free woman. Looking at the history of the trial, and the evidence, there is good reason to suspect the woman of committing the crime, which led up to an ill-omened marriage. As she stood before the altar to take upon herself the obligations of the church, she declares no man shall put aside her self as she herself if there was not some stake ground for her offense. The bride was a high-bred, hot blooded girl of seventeen; the groom, a high-toned gentleman of forty-four, the all of his class who are born to fortune, he had sounded most of the depths of the abode which make up the experience of his class. No man, suppose, who has common sense, that such a man reaches forty-four without considerable dissipation, a dissipation known and condoned and even spoken of with a jesting laugh.

WHAT IS DOING IN THE RELIGIOUS WORLD.

Agitation Over Birth of The Virgin Mary—Methodists in The Transvaal—A Long Time in The Ministry.

Dr. Pentecost has commenced his temporary ministry in Westminster chapel, London.

The Women's Missionary Society of the English Presbyterian church has 222 branches and its annual income is \$40,000.

Messrs. Crisley and Hunter are conducting special services at Picton. They will continue their labors on Sunday evening.

The presbytery of London, England, has directed that its moderator and clerk shall wear their robes during the sittings of the court.

The Irish Methodist Year Book reports a membership of 62,000, which represents an increase of over eleven percent during the past decade.

Rev. Mr. Stephens, Baptist minister of Clair Creech, LaSalle, has accepted the pastorate of the Baptist church of Kempsville and South Church.

The Apostleship of York has conveyed as a fresh gift to the villagers of Eibothorpe the reading-rooms built by him for their use many years ago.

Irish congregations in particular favor in Scotland. A prominent Glasgow congregation at present vacant, is prosecuting its search for a minister in the Emerald Isle.

The average value of £100 of tithes realizable in the Church of England for the sixty-eight years which have elapsed since the passing of the Tithes Commutation Act, 1836, is £94 17s. 11d.

To the responsible position of editor of the Sunday school Times of Philadelphia, so long and ably filled by the late Dr. Henry Clay Trumbull, Charles G. Trumbull, a son has been elected.

The quarterly board of Emerald street Methodist church, Hamilton, has given a hearty invitation to Rev. J. H. Robinson to remain pastor. A third year of his ministry has greatly prospered under Mr. Robinson's pastorate.

The position which Methodism has taken in the Transvaal may be judged from the fact that one of Wesley's journals for the city council of Pretoria six Wesleyans were elected out of a total of fifteen councillors. A Methodist was also chosen mayor.

Frank DeWitt Talmage, D. D., has accepted the pastorate of the Presbyterian church, Los Angeles. He prescribes to be attaining a little of the popularity his father enjoyed, though wanting very much in the dramatic qualities so marked in the elder Talmage.

The progress of the new and complete edition of John Wesley's Journal is proceeding slowly. The hitherto published portions of Wesley's Journal chiefly covers his post-journal days at Oxford, his home life at Epworth and Wrayce, and his adventures in Georgia.

Rev. John Gilmour, M. S., D. D., has for sixty three years been pastor of the Fifth Neck, N.S., circuit of Baptist churches. Mr. Morse is in his eighty-fifth year and only resigned his pastorate in 1886. He has been the incentive to pay off old scores.

The Baptists of Vanhook Hill have recently erected a fine brick baptistery to the rear of their church, and also repaired and otherwise improved their church, at a cost of about \$800. The re-opening services were held on Sunday and Monday, Rev. J. L. Gilmour, D. D., of Clivet Baptist church, Montreal, preached.

While many are to be heard approving of the course taken by the bishop, others are equally strong in their support of Mr. Bealy.

Dr. Monro Gibson, of London, president of the Sunday School union for 1904, has issued a message to all Sunday school teachers, calling attention to the responsibility laid upon Christian workers among the young by the fact that the Sunday schools hold the children of the working people, although the churches seem to be losing the parents.

The twelfth anniversary meetings in connection with the national memorial to the memory of Charles Huddon occurred in the city of Montreal. It is stated that it was to a sermon preached in this church that Mr. Spurgeon owed his conversion when a lad of sixteen. It is also the town in which he spent the greater portion of his boyhood days.

Rev. Father William Whitmer, rector of the English Catholic church, Rome, Italy, better known in America as general of the Pallottini order, celebrated the jubilee of his ordination to the priesthood this week, receiving many presents, including the autograph of the pope on a photograph, a gold vest set from the Dowager Queen Margherita and cheques from England and America amounting to sixteen hundred dollars.

GRIPPE CAUSED DEATH. State Health Department Issues Report For The Year.

Albany, Feb. 6.—The state department of health, in its bulletin of vital statistics, published to-day, states that there were 127,100 deaths during the past year in this state, which makes a mortality per 1,000 population of 16.7. While the total mortality is about 3,000 greater than that of last year, the estimated increase in population reduces the death rate from that of 17 per 1,000 population. The infant mortality exceeded that of 1902 by 1,500, but it was exceptional low in that year, and it is still 4,000 less than the average.

Smallpox caused 41 deaths, all but 16 occurring in and about Rochester. Most of the deaths occurred in the first half of the year. The disease has re-occurred during the fall in Chautauque, Cattaraugus, Orleans, Niagara and Warren counties and in the region about Northern Saratoga Limited outbreaks have occurred in numerous other localities. There were 10,250 deaths from pneumonia. Grippe is estimated to have caused 8,000 deaths.
