A Principle Involved in One-Question of Punishing Pupils Fully Considered—Prof. Martin's Proposed Change Rejected. The board of education met last night, in attendance being Chairman Hyde and Trustees Donaldson, Elliott, Fee, Haffner, Lamb, Latturey, Martin, McKeelvey, A. N. Richardson, S. Thompson.

Communications Read. From Miss Kate Weston, asking to be relieved of her duties as teacher in the collegiate institute at Easter. Referred to management committee.
