**WILL CHALLENGE SCHWAB.**  
Baron Roginat is After the Millionaire.  
Paris, Feb. 23.—Baron Roginat, who subscribed \$26,000 as a French underwriter to the shipbuilding trust, wants to fight a duel with Charles M. Schwab.  
"I am furious with Schwab," said the baron to a correspondent. "I am furious with him," he added, "and will prosecute him for defamation and robbery. It was Schwab who inspired the defamatory articles in the newspapers that have appeared about me. I am glad to catch him here, and will apply the French law to him. The public will not be sympathetic to him. I would like to fight a duel with him, and will try to arrange one. I will defend my honor and pocket against all men."  
"Don't know him," says Schwab.

**SAILOR SENT TO PRISON.**  
Gets Long Sentence For Robbery in New York.  
New York, Feb. 23.—A sentence of seven years in Sing Sing was pronounced by Recorder Goff on Walter Davis, a sailor, who had pleaded guilty to robbery in the first degree. On Feb. 21st Davis, with three other men entered a store here and robbed the proprietor and a few days later he was implicated in a burglary which resulted in a pistol fight between Davis and a policeman, both being wounded.

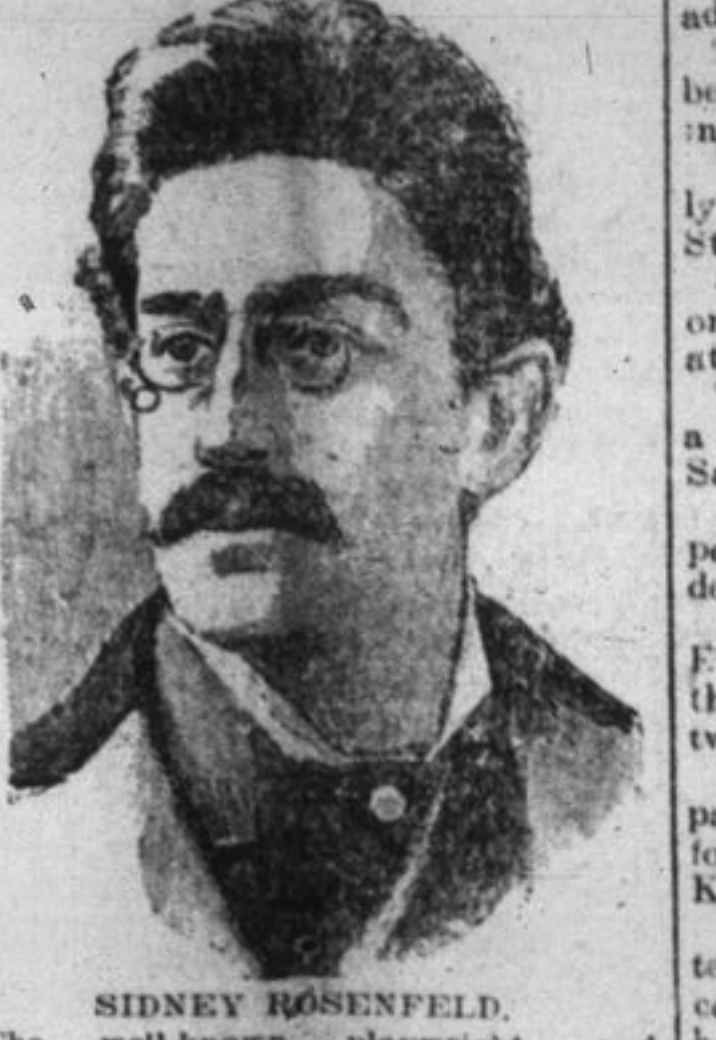

## WAS BREACH

**Of the World's General Neutrality Laws.**  
**BARONDEROSEN**  
HAS SOME HOT THINGS TO SAY OF JAPAN.  
A View of Chemulpo By a Times Writer—Russia is Said to be in Financial Difficulties—An Italian Hoped For Victory For Japan.  
Hong Kong, Feb. 23.—Baron De Rosen, lately the Russian minister at Tokio, and the Russian military and naval attaché and consul, arrived here, yesterday, from Japan on their way to Russia. Baron De Rosen interviewed, said that the naval fight at Chemulpo was a breach of neutrality and a cowardly action on the part of the Japanese who knew, before the declaration of war, the exact date which they were going to attack and land at Chemulpo. An important point, he said, lay in the fact that the Japanese had been holding for many months the telegraph lines of Korea, in spite of the fact that Korea was a perfectly neutral country. Admiral Alexieff suspected the Japanese of intercepting a telegram in cipher, ordering the Varig to leave Chemulpo, and return to Port Arthur. This telegram was never received and the Varig remained in ignorance of the situation until the Japanese warships arrived.

## TO DROP TRIGGS.

University Does Not Like His Comparisons.  
Chicago, Feb. 23.—The name of Dr. Oscar Lowell Triggs, instructor in English at the University of Chicago, has been dropped. After July 1st his connection with the university will cease. The action of the trustees comes as a surprise to Prof. Triggs. The consensus of opinion, however, is that Prof. Triggs' liberal view and the unusual statements he has made in his lectures, especially in public lectures, have proved distasteful to the high authorities of the university.  
The statement of Prof. Triggs that brought him most conspicuously before the public was his ranking Rockefeller and Pullman with Shakespeare, Longfellow, Holmes, Lowell and other American poets and his denunciation of many church hymns as "doggerel."

Everything suggests that the Japanese contemplate an immediate dash for a strategic position in Northern Korea.  
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**SIDNEY ROSENFELD.**  
The well-known playwright and theatrical manager, who is anxious to establish a theatre on the lines of the so-called national theatre. Mr. Rosenfeld has contracted with a number of noted players for the launch of his project at once, though doubt is expressed as to his ability to secure a New York playhouse at the present time.

**TRAVELLERS TWO SAVED.**  
A British Steamer at the Storm's Mercy.  
New York, Feb. 23.—The German Silesian line steamer Alamo, Capt. Knudhold, from Hamburg, brought to port Capt. Raymond Parker, and twenty-seven shipwrecked men of the British freight steamer Kentigern, which she abandoned at sea on February 16th in a sinking condition.  
The Alamo left Hamburg February 3rd with a general cargo, but no passengers. She experienced very stormy weather and on February 16th at 7 a.m., sighted the Kentigern of Glasgow, lying distress signals. She was blowing heavily and had a heavy list. She signalled "With to abandon ship."  
"We launched a lifeboat in charge of our chief officer and four men, and with considerable difficulty succeeded in rescuing Capt. Parker and nineteen men," said Capt. Knudhold. "Meanwhile the Kentigern launched one of her boats with the remaining twelve members of her crew, who managed to come alongside and were taken on board the Alamo, saving nothing but the clothes they stood in."  
Justice Britton  
Won't Direct—Says It Isn't His Business.  
Toronto, Feb. 23.—Despite the fact that Justice Britton has reserved in the Ontario Court of Appeal his right to block the civic investigation into the irregularities at the last municipal elections, it has been decided to proceed with the enquiry pending a decision by the court on the application of Samuel Thompson, the accused D.R.O., probably will take place to-day. After the argument in the injunction case had been finished, Mr. Riddell urged Justice Britton to postpone it until it would be proper to proceed with the investigation, as time was a very essential part of the contract. Justice Britton, however, refused to direct, declaring that it was no part of his business to do this. The matter was thus left to the discretion of Mr. Riddell, who, after a conference with his colleagues, decided to proceed with the investigation this morning. It is also believed that some of the injunction proceedings are several of the accused deputy returning officers, who are determined to fight the charges against them.

## WORLD NEWS.

**Despatches From Near And Distant Places.**  
**EVENTS OF DAY**  
**GIVEN IN THE BRIEFEST POSSIBLE FORM.**  
**Matters That Interest Everybody.**  
Notes From all Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.  
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## A NAVAL STRONGHOLD.

There Are Only a Few Fortifications.  
London, Feb. 23.—A correspondent cables that Port Arthur is now strictly a naval stronghold and the fortifications are being manned by naval gunners. Only twenty-one regulars are now at Port Arthur and they are traders, disposing of their merchandise. Some of them are under suspicion and there is a "heightening" of their "being arrested." There are many complaints of unwarranted arrests, unexplained explosions and defamations of character by the Port Arthur police.  
The report that large bodies of Cossacks and other troops are occupying New Chung and Hsin-Ming-Tin are unfounded.  
A Daily Mail despatch from Hong Kong says a British squadron is concentrating there, and that a corresponding French concentration of warships is occurring at Saigon, Indo-China. This is supposedly a result of the Anglo-French understanding.  
Fired On British Steamer.  
Wei Hai Wei, Feb. 23.—The British steamer Ching Ping belonging to the Chinese Engineering and Mining company of Shanghai, has arrived here from Port Dalry and reports that the also was fired upon by the Russians, and was hit seven times around the water line. A Russian pilot boat that was coming out of Port Dalry to pilot the Ching Ping was blown up by a mine.  
Russia's Difficulties.  
St. Petersburg, Feb. 23.—Heavy snows and blizzards over the Siberian railroad, especially east of Baikal, are greatly increasing the difficulties of transporting troops, besides better enabling Chinese brigands to operate. Japanese agents are reported north of Vladivostok, inciting the brigands to action.
