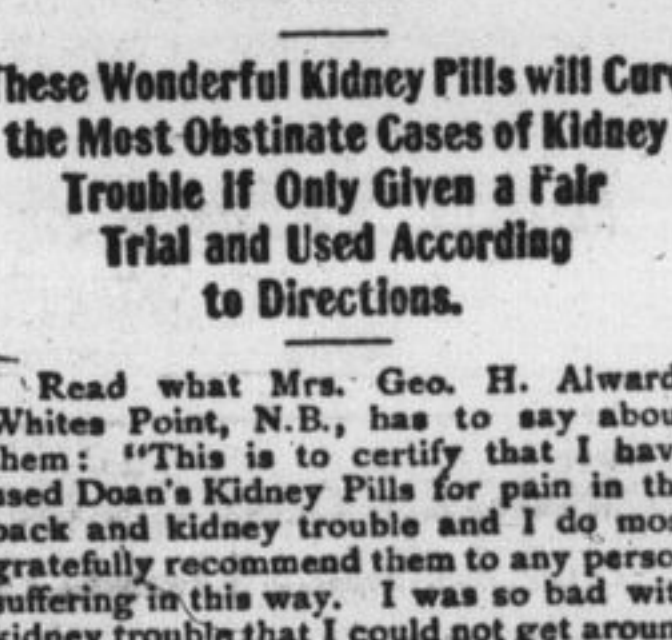

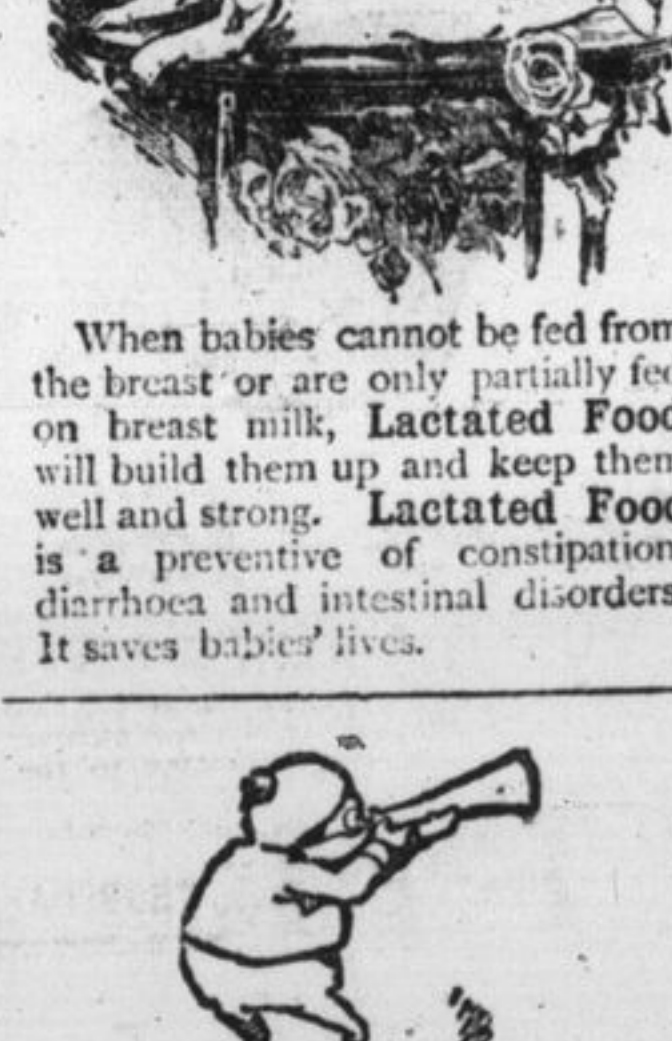

MUST NOT MARRY
 Without Approval Of Bank Officials.
 Chicago, Feb. 23.—There was posted in the Corn Exchange National Bank a notice which reads in substance as follows:
 "Employees of this bank receiving a salary of less than \$1,000 a year must not marry without first consulting the bank officials and obtaining their approval."
 Officers of the bank state that the action was not taken to discourage matrimony under proper circumstances. Vice-President D. A. Moulton said: "We issued that order because we believed it was nonsense for a man to attempt to take care of a wife and family with an annual income of below \$1,000. We start young men in as inspectors at a small salary and increase it as they show aptness and ability for the work. Most of them rise rapidly, and are paid accordingly. It would be folly for any man to marry before they are able to support a wife. We should feel ourselves partly responsible for any misery which might follow if we approved of such a course."

Found Her Lost Son.
 Syracuse, N.Y., Feb. 23.—Joseph E. Allen left Trenton, Ont., eighteen years ago, leaving in Rochester, N. Y. His mother and her family never trace could be secured of him. The mother is now rejoiced to find that a long search which she had instituted and many prayers she had offered that the child see him again had been rewarded.
