A GOOD CHAIRMAN. Compliment From Other Side Of



The Ontario legislature has probably never had a better committee chairman than Hon. J. M. Gibson. Whatever faults the attorney-general may have, his opponents cannot charge him with lacking the ability to direct the deliberations of a committee. As he sits at the head of the table he impresses the members with the conviction that he knows what he is about and proposes to settle the business in hand without loss of time. Those who appear to urge a case quickly apprehend that he, at least, seizes the salient points at once, Where he is at fault, the argument is highly technical, and then he will not let it pass until by a fuller explanation he understands the details. While never losing sight of the main lines of argument, he permits the widest latitude to the speakers, and shows by his searching inquiries that he is close to the heart of the question under discussion. His courtesy is unfail ing. Even when counsel is stupid, or urposely ignorant of the point at is sue, Mr. Gibson seldom loses his temper. On those rare occasions he gives his head a shake that betokens annoyance, and puts a query, or makes a remark that shows impatience with the denseness of the individual. But that is only momentary, and a bright auggestion restores his good humor mmediately. He is thorough, He conveys that impression in one session of committee, and confirms it in two. His success in this important department of legislative work is due to several things. He has a wide knowledge of affairs, as becomes a lawyer; he is anxious to get at the kernel of a question, like a newspaper man; he is a good listener, which marks the politician; he has an open mind until he reaches what seems to him the inevitable conclusion, then he has a firm conviction for which he fights, which is the quality of a good legislator. He exercises his authority with a suavity that renders service under him agreeable, and yet he makes his fluence felt in a way that accomplishes results. His mind is broad and clear and forceful, and his personality in spires confidence and denotes strength
