COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going on in the Business World—The Markets.

James Ross is said to hold \$4,300,000 of Dominion Coal stock. Hon. Geo. A. Cox holds 3,280 shares of Canadian Bank of Commerce stock.

The shareholders of the Delaware & Hudson railway have approved of an increase of \$10,000,000 in the capital stock.

Statistics are produced to show that there has been expended upon the 5,994 miles of Siberian railway up to this time nearly half a billion dollars—\$450,000,000.

The annual report of the Western Union Telegraph company shows 90,000,000 messages transmitted, \$20,000,000 earned; net revenue \$6,000,000, and a surplus of \$13,000,000.

The returns of the work at the Paris mint in 1908 show the value of gold coined as \$17,822,630, silver \$315,760, nickel \$200,000, and bronze \$108,750.

The total exports of apples from Canada and the United States for the season up to February 20th were 3,112,007 barrels, the largest on record, an increase of about 1,000,000 barrels over the corresponding period last year, and nearly 80,000 barrels over the entire harvest season of 1896-97.

DEPUTATION WAITS ON GOVERNMENT RE MUNICIPAL MATTERS.

A Bill Prepared On Local Vote—Premier Will Try To Meet Views—Ex-Mayor Howland's Letter About Civic Affairs.

Toronto, March 9.—A deputation of twenty-five municipalities from Grey, waited on the government this morning, to urge that the provisions of the municipal act allowing local municipalities to adopt a new way of constituting council be not postponed, as requested by the forty councilors.

A deputation from Orillia waited on the government to-day and urged a subsidy for the James Bay railway to be built by Mackenzie & Mann.

At the opening of the civic investigation this morning a long letter was read from ex-Mayor Howland, in which he made an explanation of his neglect to act when informed two years ago that the council had been properly placed on the assessment rolls.

The motion to quash the by-law of the town of Perth to take over the Perth Electric Light company came up at Osgeooke Hall to-day, but was adjourned for a week.

The public accounts committee of the legislature this morning began the examination of W. B. Russell, engineer of the Temiskaming railway, as to the estimates for the construction of the line.

The gross earnings of the C.N.R. for the week ended March 7th are \$43,500, an increase of \$8,900. Gross earnings since July last are \$2,158,400, an increase of \$697,150.

Bessie Gilmour, alias Bessie Davis, released this morning from a six months' term in the reformatory, was arrested on a warrant laid by Sheriff's Officer Seamon, Rimington, N.Y., where she is wanted.

The municipal taxation committee of the legislature to-day changed the basis of assessment under the business tax for distillers from 125 to 150 per cent, and changed the basis for brewers from 100 to 75 per cent.

The committee raised the business tax on coal and wood dealers from twenty-five per cent. to fifty per cent. The committee has now concluded its labors and will report the bill to the legislature this afternoon.

FOR EIGHT DAYS

C.P.R. Between Toronto And Owen Sound Tied Up.

Toronto, March 9.—There has been no Canadian Pacific railway train between Toronto and Owen Sound since the past eight days. Shelburne was gained yesterday, but the road to Owen Sound is still blocked. Another snow storm above Orangeville has reported yesterday, but this can be easily overcome, if the ice that has formed in the tracks for miles can be removed.

CHOKED TO DEATH.

While Eating In The Cecil Cafe, Montreal.

Montreal, March 9.—David Kay, agent, forty-eight years of age, who resided at 53 Cathcart street, was accidentally choked to death, last night, by a piece of meat sticking in his windpipe while he was eating in the Cecil Cafe, 127 McGill street. Those in the cafe did everything possible to assist the unfortunate man and the ambulance was summoned from the General Hospital, but before it arrived the man was dead.

At Venerable Age.

Hamilton, Ont., March 9.—The funeral took place yesterday of Mrs. Henderson, widow of Rev. Joseph Henderson, M. A., of Rev. William Gould, and sister of Rev. Dr. Gould, her father and brother having occupied the historic pulpit of the 'Martyrs' church, Edinburgh, for a hundred years. Rev. W. G. Henderson, Montreal, is a son. Deceased was aged ninety-four years.

The Law Repealed.

Berlin, March 9.—The 'bundesrat' has assented to a bill already passed by the Reichstag abolishing the anti-Jesuit law, which prohibits the presence of Jesuits in Germany. Only the emperor's certain assent is necessary to make the bill law. Thus Protestant Germany has practically decided to countenance what Catholic France will not tolerate.

Frightfully Mangled.

Niagara Falls, Ont., March 9.—Harvey Smith, a resident of Niagara Falls South, employed on the power works, was killed by a M. C. R. train at Falls View this morning, his body being frightfully mangled. The unfortunate man stepped off one track out of the way of an approaching train and was struck by a train going in the opposite direction.

A Year For False Alarm.

London, March 9.—John Hooper, a young man of twenty years, was sent to the Central prison for a year for sending in a false alarm to the fire department. The sentence was made severe, because the practice of sending in false alarms had become quite common of late.

The King Is Out.

London, March 9.—King Edward to-day made his first public appearance since his attack of cold last week. His majesty accompanied by Queen Alexandra drove to the Hunter's Improvement Society's show at Agricultural Hall. The royal couple received a rousing ovation.

LYNCH LAW IN OHIO.

A Negro Taken From Jail And Shot.

Springfield, O., March 8.—Richard Dixon, a negro, was taken from the jail here at eleven o'clock last night and shot to death in the jail yard by a mob. His body was then taken to the corner of Main and Fountain avenue and hung to a telegraph pole, where the mob spent the next half hour striking the body with clubs from several hundred revolvers. The mob forced an entrance to the jail by butting in the east doors with a railway tie.

Dixon shot Charles Callis, a policeman, last Sunday, while they were both in the former's room in a hotel. Dixon had decided to omit the place, and fearing trouble with Anna Corbett, a woman with whom he was acquainted, he asked Callis to go to his hotel with him. While in his room Dixon and Miss Corbett quarrelled, and Dixon is said to have shot her in the breast. The policeman then attempted to strike the body of the latter fired into the officer's body, inflicting fatal wounds. Callis died yesterday.

ISOLATED NEWBURGH.

Five Days Without Mail—Division Court Cases.

Newburgh, March 7.—Last week we were without a train service entirely, the B. of Q., where not snowed in being kept back by ice. Large numbers of men from this village helped the company for a couple of days in their fight against the storm king. Some excitedly expected individual thought the Japs were going to storm the town on Friday, but it turned out to be eighty men preceding Harry Whitling's train to clear the tracks. Then on Sunday evening a train came through from Yorker, bringing with it five days' mail from the north, and the genial postmaster and his assistant didn't smile a bit when five large mail bags filled to the brim came their way into the local office on Sunday evening. However, they went right to work, and in a few hours, probably, the largest mail ever brought into Newburgh at one time was distributed. Last evening it started to rain and kept it up all night and to-day. To-night it has ceased and a thick fog is falling. Many cellars are flooded and there is a great deal of water in some of the streets. Many of the high school students were unable to get home Friday, owing to the demoralized train service.
