FUR FARMERS

To Prevent Mould On Butter-The Earthworm a Beneficial Insect - Canadian Egg Trade -Women in Agriculture.

Statistics show that in a single year the eggs produced in the United States have been worth more than 8250,000,000. Hens do not go on strikes. They consume little, and demand little of the community, except the right to scratch in the least valuable plots of ground. No class of laborers can excel them in conscientious and skilful production.

The question of wide vs. narrow tires on vehicles intended for hauling heavy loads was discussed at the good roads convention at Ottawa on March 17th and 18th.

One of the most beneficial insects is the earthworm. Earthworms (or fishworms, as the small boys call them) are the friends of the agriculturist; they are found everywhere, and the honey-combed their burrows. They bring tons upon tons of earth periodically to the surface and expose it to the action of frost, carbonic acid and humus acid (from decaying leaves and plants). They pass tons upon tons of earth annually through their bodies, disintegrate many particles of mineral matter, making them suitable to be absorbed by roots of plants. They draw down leaves into the soil, tear them into fine shreds, digest or partly digest them and mix them with the earth, thereby forming the rich, humus soil. Some one has said: "Destroy the earthworms and before long the greater part of our earth would be reduced to the condition of a desert."
