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

The girl charged that Mallen made improper proposals to her and in the hotel shed at Cataraqui choked her and threw her over the back of the seat, while they were alone, her sister and Wilkison having gone into the hotel. She was unconscious for some time. The assaulter did not succeed in his purpose. On the way home they got into pitch holes, and one time Iola and Wilkison got out again she was alone with Mallen who made another attempt. Both the young men

were drunk. 
