EXAMINATION RESULTS.

Standing Of The Students At The Kingston Dairy School.

The Dairy School long course, which opened on January 14th and closed on March 9th, was exceptionally well attended, the school building being taxed beyond its limited capacity.

In the cheese course the examinations were on cheese making, milk testing, bacteriology and general dairying for which 600 marks were given in the practical and written work. The results were: G. A. Sheriff, 183; G. H. Taylor, 177; J. H. Wilson, 167; A. A. McDonald, 143; T. J. Coffey, 147; H. W. Coleman, 143; W. Dool, 132; O. N. Sandwith, 126; Ernest Hogg, 107; W. M. McIntyre, 106; J. K. Anderson, 102; A. Mathison, J. R. Brown, G. Blanche, 101; F. Findlay, 37; E. Leeder, 36; R. J. McDonald, 36.

In the butter course the examinations were on butter making, separators, milk testing, bacteriology and general dairying with 800 marks. The results in the practical and written work were: J. H. Wilson, 628 marks; A. A. McDonald, 592; H. W. Coleman, 573; E. Findlay, 538; Z. K. Anderson, 500; R. Robson, 490.

In the event of the premier's resignation, it is understood that Mr. Turgeon, the present minister of agriculture, will become premier of Quebec.
