AN EXPERIMENT IN TECHNICAL EDUCATION IN HIGH SCHOOL.

Paper Read By Principal Ellis, of Kingston, at The O. E. A. Trustees' Department Meeting in Toronto.

At the meeting of the trustees department of the Ontario Educational Association in Toronto on Tuesday afternoon, H. S. Ellis, principal of the Kingston collegiate institute read a paper on "An Experiment in Elementary Technical Education in the High School."

Mr. Ellis said that the experiment referred to was an experiment made by the board of education in the city of Kingston to induce those boys of the fourth class, who year by year were drifting out of school at about the entrance stage, to continue their studies for a longer time. In describing any attempt of this kind it is not enough to mention details and results; one must have knowledge of the underlying causes to which the movement is due in order to rightly understand its significance.

It is probably no exaggeration to say that men who are not yet past middle life have seen a greater development since the close of the American civil war, in all that makes progress in civilization, than any two previous centuries within the historic period have produced. Edward VII. is not far removed by years from William IV., but in those elements that make the life of man better, that lengthen and intensify human existence, that lift mankind from savagery into a civilized existence, Edward VII. is farther away from William IV. than William IV. is from Alfred of the Saxons.

Our fathers and their predecessors to remote generations have been familiar with the system of apprenticeship that has gone out of existence within the memory of men now living. It was the background of the exigencies of modern industrial life. But when apprenticeship of the former times went, there went with it one of the great moulding, educating influences of the age, for the boy who served his time under the conditions then prevalent, learned much more than the mere use of tools; he got the training which made him an independent tradesman and a useful citizen.

The migration of great numbers of people to urban centres affect the educational situation, in some respects adversely. The self-reliance, the resourcefulness, the sense of power that comes from successful effort, to the boy brought up amid farm life and country scenes, is likely to be replaced by the over-direction of the graded school that tends to stifle the initiative and check resource, and by the over-stimulation of surroundings that do not make for vigor and singleness of effort.

The altered manner of life is closely connected with the struggle for existence and supremacy which, on the one hand, demands from the child, a better outfitting for the child, and, on the other, tempts that same child away from school to become a wage earner at an immature age.

that far, and shall have benefited by all that has done. There is no long and tedious preparation just to be qualified to take up some study in the future. The curriculum is made up of four departments, English, including history and geography, mathematics, science and manual training.

The English is intended to give that facility and accuracy in the use of language which will enable the student to write a terse, concise, correct report, letter or description; and to read intelligently both for general information and for special knowledge along any line that he may require.

History treats of the present conditions of the various parts of the empire and the countries most closely associated with it. Geography is taught as man's relationship to the earth in the way of habitation, production, industry, transportation, etc. Natural conditions are important to the beginner especially as they affect settlement and trade in mathematics and science the work is made as practical as possible by the selection of exercises that relate to the ordinary employments and life of the people; the design being to show that school work should not consist of doing certain problems prescribed in books, but of getting power to deal with those that actually arise in business and the workman's operations.

LESS SCRAPING

TO BE DONE ON STREETS THAN BEFORE.

This Is Due To The Scavenger System—Scraping Not To Begin Till Next Week—Advice About Broken Sidewalks. It is not intended by the city engineer to have any street scraping done until next week. At present the frost is not nearly out of the ground, and it would not be wise to make a start yet.

The expectation is that street scraping this year will cost much less than in previous years, on account of the scavenger system that was operated in 1903. It will be noticed that the sides of the roads throughout the city are much cleaner than ever before, very little refuse having been left from the autumn. The result will be less scraping. Thus it is expected that the scavenger system, by which the streets are kept so tidy, will really cost the city nothing, since it creates a saving in street scraping.

A word of advice might well be given at this early season regarding broken boards in sidewalks. If every citizen would make a definite report to the city engineer's office, by telephone, postal card or personal visit, as to defective planks, etc., it would be far better than making complaints to the newspapers and expecting the latter to raise a storm. The city engineer will be glad to receive that help from the people, and when reports are made he will give immediate orders to the patcher. City officials are always on the lookout for defective walks, but Kingston is a big place when walks are concerned. There are seventy-two miles of them.
