GOLDEN HOARD Miser's Big Fortune Found in His Room.

Had \$56,000 Secreted Under Carpets and Behind Old Pictures—He Was Quite Original.

Paris, April 6.—One of the strangest discoveries of hidden wealth in the history of Paris has just come to light. In December, 1901, M. Narcisse Thibaut, a bachelor, of sixty-three, who occupied a room at No. 38 Rue des Boulangers, and never received visitors, was suddenly seized. It was first of all thought that he had gone on a journey, but as time passed and he did not reappear, the concierge became alarmed and informed the landlord, who, in turn, communicated with the relatives of M. Thibaut.

Nothing more was found until a fortnight later, when a more thorough investigation was made, with amazing results. Under the carpet, and hidden behind clippings were some amounting to \$5,000. Another \$10,000 was revealed on opening an uncut copy of a French translation of "Paradise Lost."

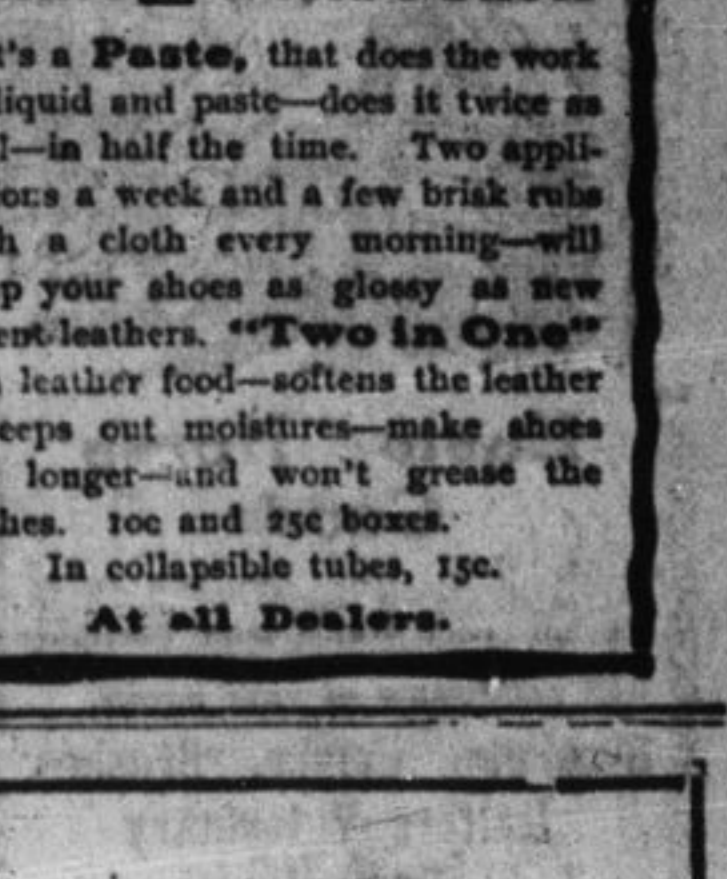
