Because, since last year, \$101, of a new Erie canal (permanently ires from tolis) from Buffalo to New York has been voted, and will place the inland route via New York in a position of superiority, as compared with the present Canadian inland route; and also because the present uncertainty in regard to Canadian canal tolls acts as a restraint on owners in providing the necessary facilities

Because Canadian steamers are still subject to payment in the Uni ted States in consequence of the imposition of fees in this country upon United States steamers, and because the arguments and expressions of pub-lic opinion which were found sufficient last year to warrant removing these fees and placing them under the control of the governor-general in-council, are equally sufficient to support a request to have the fees removed altogether, a complete and final abrogation of these fees in Canada upor both United States and Canadian steamers should now be granted.

But when the large upper lake vessels can, by the enlargement of the Welland canal, extend their voyage the longer haul with its increased remuneration, which will then be open to these vessels, will cause them to become feeders to the Canadian route

"The comparative facilities will then be: By the New York route-A steamof 6,000 tons for 900 miles to Buffalo, and barge of 1,000 tons for 450 miles to New York. By the Canadian route-A steamer of 6/000 tons for 1, 100 miles to east end of Lake On: tario, and barge of 2,000 tons for 170 miles to Montreal; and this difference places the advantage decidedly

with the Canadian route. "It is affirmed that a shorter route for a lew Weiland canal from the Lake E ie level, west of the present canal, and that only seven or eight modern locks of large dimensions will be necessary instead of the large number of smaller ones now in use.

"The immediate improvement of Port Colhorne harbor at the Lake Erie end of the Welland canal, would, during the construction of the enlarged canal, permit transhipment from the large upper lake vessels into smaller ones carrying the grain from Port Colborne to Montreal, but, for the following reasons, it cannot become a permanent substitute for the enlargement of the canal itself because: (1) It fails to secure the longer haul for the larger upper lake vessels, which will change their position of rivals into that of feeders of the Canadian route; (2) The vessels suitable for the voyage from Port Colborne to Montreal, having to traverse Lake Ontario, just necessarily be heavier, more expensive, and of less capacity than only from the eas. end of Lake Ontario to Montreal; (3) If a steam harge is used to tow lake barges from Port Colborne to the east end of Lake Ontario, the additional expense of a river tug from there to Montreal must tions do not permit a steam barge to handle a tow on the river; and (4)

FARMERS AT MARBLE ROCK MAKE A THREAT.

Association - Threaten To Take The Law In Their Own rockville Recorder

The farmers whose land is situated and around Marble Rock dam, about seven miles out of Gananoque, have again risen in their might, and at a meeting held recently threatened to take the law in their own hands some precaution were not taken to save their lands from being flood-With the advance of each spring he stream of water from Charleston lake, which supplies the power to the several Gananoque factories, and which is dammed at Marble Rock to give it sufficient current, overflows the dam, and consequently inundates the property and causes much loss to the farmers of that neighborhood. Recently the farmers of that neigh borhood organized themselves into what they termed a Farmers' Protective Society, for the purpose of protecting their property and fighting the case, which has been a contentious matter in the courts at Toronto

for some months past. A crisis in the trouble has appar ently been reached. W. B. Carroll, of Gananoque, solicitor for the Water Power company, arrived in town Monday and before Judge McDonald made application on behalf of the company to restrain the Farmers' Protective Society from injuring or destroying the Marble Rock dam. As stated above, the lands in the district are now flooded to a considerable extent, and the farmers are consequently very wrathy, and a few days ago notified the Water Power company that they would hold a meeting at Sand Bay Corners to deal with the matter and if necessary, take the law in their own hands. Deputy Sheriff Traill left for Marble Rock to serve the defendants with the writ and injunction and the matter will come up again at Toronto in a few days. Messrs. John W. 
